

The handshakes, hugs, and a rare display of camaraderie, moments where PM Modi physically drew the other two leaders together, stole the spotlight at the summit meeting of leaders.

"The recent trilateral gathering of Putin, Xi, and Modi at the 2025 SCO Summit in Tianjin represents much more than diplomatic choreography or photo opportunities; it is a moment of consequence that throws the United States' twenty-five-year project of rapprochement and deepening partnership with India into sharp relief," a report in 'One World Outlook' detailed.

"While US policy enters a phase of unpredictability and economic confrontation, the visible warmth and symbolism displayed among the leaders of Russia, China, and India underscore the risks of strategic complacency in Washington and the historic value of treating India as an unshakeable partner-not a bargaining chip," it added

The report emphasized that Modi's visit to China marked his first in seven years -- a period defined by longstanding Sino-Indian tensions, including the Ladakh border dispute, mutual restrictions on investment and technology exchange. The visible warmth between the leaders conveyed a strong message that, in an era of US protectionism and punitive tariffs, especially

targeting India, the Eurasian powers are indicating their intent to set their own rules and alliances.

According to the report, in contrast to some Western interpretations, India's participation at the summit is neither a shift eastward nor any alignment with Russia or China's agendas.

India continues to assert its strategic

autonomy, which was clearly reflected in its assertive statements on terrorism at the summit, serving as a subtle rebuke to Pakistan in the latter's presence.

The report stated that as India garners global backing for its stance on Kashmir and beyond, its decades-old non-alignment policy remains active, driven by self-interest and the aim to maximize leverage in the evolving contemporary world landscape.

"Recent years saw breakthrough agreements on cybersecurity, advanced communications (COMCASA), and export controls, as well as new joint initiatives around semiconductor supply chains and clean energy. India's demographic, economic, and technological potential is undeniable: with a population projected to surpass China's, a youthful workforce, and ambitions to be the world's next manufacturing hub, India is one of the few countries with both the scale and credibility to anchor a democratic order in the Indo-Pacific," the report noted

"To treat India as a secondary power or worse, to penalize it for hedging its bets amidst a more aggressive US-China rivalry - would be a costly strategic mistake." it further stressed. *IANS*

Give my warmest regards to Putin, Kim as you conspire against us: Trump to Xi

WASHINGTON: US President Donald Trump recently launched a blistering attack on Chinese President Xi Jinping for hosting Russian President Vladimir Putin and North Korean leader Kim Jong Un at a grand military parade in Beijing.

In a strongly worded post on Truth Social, Trump accused the trio of "conspiring against the United States" and questioned whether China would acknowledge the American soldiers who "gave their blood" to help liberate the country during World War II.

The event was held to commemorate the 80th anniversary of the end of World War II.

In a post that was part condemnation and part sarcasm, Trump questioned whether China would acknowledge the role the United States played in helping liberate it from Japanese occupation during World War II.

"The big question to be answered is whether or not President Xi of China will mention the massive amount of support and 'blood' that The United States of America gave to China in order to help it to

secure its FREEDOM from a very unfriendly foreign invader," Trump wrote.

"Many Americans died in China's quest for Victory and Glory. I hope that they are

rightfully Honored and Remembered for their Bravery and Sacrifice! May President Xi and the wonderful people of China have a great and lasting day of celebration," he added.

In a striking closing line, Trump quipped: "Please give my warmest regards to Vladimir Putin, and Kim Jong Un, as you conspire against The United States of America."

Trump's remarks come as Beijing hosts an elaborate military parade featuring some of its closest allies, including Russian President Vladimir Putin and North Korean leader Kim Jong Un.

Footage from the event showed Kim shaking hands with Xi, in a rare public appearance outside North Korea. Xi was also seen warmly greeting Putin, following their recent meeting at the Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO) Summit in Tianjin. *IANS*

Deepak Mittal appointed India's new Ambassador to UAE

NEW DELHI: Deepak Mittal has been appointed as the next Ambassador of India to the United Arab Emirates (UAE), the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) announced.

A seasoned diplomat belonging to the 1998 batch of the Indian Foreign Service (IFS) who is currently serving as an Additional Secretary at the Prime Minister's Office (PMO), he is expected to take up the assignment shortly.

Having also served as India's Ambassador to Qatar, Mittal played a crucial role in holding first discussions with the Taliban regime after the United States withdrew its troops from Afghanistan in 2021.

As the Indian envoy to Doha, Mittal met Sher Mohammad Abbas Stanekzai, the Head of Taliban's Political Office in Doha on August 31, 2021. IANS

"India kills us with tariffs": Donald Trump again claims New Delhi offered "no tariff" deal

WASHINGTON, DC: US President Donald Trump again claimed that New Delhi has offered him a "no tariff" deal as he justified his move to impose a 50 percent levy on Indian goods.

In a telephonic interview on The Scott Jennings Radio Show, Trump claimed that he understands tariffs better than any human being and criticized India, which he

believes is the "most tariffed nation" in the world.

"China kills us with tariffs, India kills us with tariffs, Brazil kills us with tariffs. I've understood tariffs better than they did; I understood tariffs better than any human beings in the world. India was the most highly tariffed nation in the world, and

you know what, they've offered me no tariffs in India anymore. No tariffs. If I didn't have tariffs, they would never make that offer. So you have to have tariffs," Donald Trump said.

This is not the first time that Trump has mentioned a "no tariff deal." Earlier, he claimed the business relationship between the two countries for many decades has been "totally one-sided", "onesided disaster" and also that "they have now offered to cut their tariffs to nothing, but it's getting late".

"What few people understand is that

now a totally one sided relationship, and it has been for many decades. The reason is that India has charged us, until now, such high Tariffs, the most of any country, that our businesses are unable to sell into India," he said.

"It has been a totally one-sided disaster! Also, India buys most of its oil and military products from Russia, very little



we do very little business with India, but they do a tremendous amount of business with us. In other words, they sell us massive amounts of goods, their biggest "client," but we sell them very little - Until

from the U.S. They have now offered to cut their Tariffs to nothing, but it's getting late. They should have done so years ago. Just some simple facts for people to ponder!!!" he added.

New Delhi is facing global uncertainties due to heightened economic tensions following the US imposition of a 50 percent tariff on Indian imports, which was supplemented by an additional 25 percent due to its purchase of Russian crude oil.

However, Donald Trump has himself faced severe backlash from his own country's political clout after a US appeals court ruled the tariffs "illegal."

Former US National Security Advisor (NSA) Jake Sullivan has alleged that Trump has "thrown away" ties with India over Pakistan's willingness to do business with Trump's family.

"US has worked to build a relationship with India, a country that we should be aligned with on technology, talent, economics and so many issues. And align with dealing with strategic threats from China. Now. I think because of Pakistan's willingness to do business with the Trump family, Trump has thrown away India's relationship on the side. Germany or Japan will look at that (India) and say that could be us tomorrow. America's friends will think that they can't rely on us in any way." Jake Sullivan told MeidasTouch.

President and CEO of US-India Strategic Partnership Forum (USISPF), Mukesh Aghi also suggested that some claims of Donald Trump may not have any substance. ANI

BEIJING: Prime Minister Narendra Modi emphasized peace and stability along the border with China during his meeting with the Chinese President Xi Jinping in Tianjin on the sidelines of the Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO) summit, in a set-

ting where every gesture was carefully measured, a recent report cited.

It said that yet sixty thousand soldiers remain deployed, disengaged but alert, underscoring the enduring lack of mutual trust between India and China.

"The Himalayan border - unsettled and dis-

puted - has continued to cast its long shadow on this relationship of 2.8 billion people: the bitter conflict of 1962, the clashes of 1967, Tulung-La in 1975, Sumdorong Chu in 1986, Doklam in 2017, Galwan in 2020, and again in the subliminal distrust that still lingers under what is being sold as the new thaw in relations since October 2024," wrote former Indian

Foreign Secretary and distinguished Indian Foreign Service officer Nirupama Rao in India Narrative.

"Pilgrimages to Kailash-Mansarovar have resumed after a five-year hiatus. Direct flights are set to resume, and visa fa-

> cilitation will be more streamlined. Meanwhile, India runs a deficit of \$100 billion in imports of Chinese goods, exposing, inter alia, the harsh reality of our manufacturing (and pharmaceutical) industry's dependence on Chinese inputs - thus defining the paradoxes of detente and dependency held in uneasy

balance," the expert added.

According to the report, in Tianjin, both China and India have committed to a partnership rather than rivalry in carefully crafted diplomacy.

The bow is drawn, the aim uncertain. More than being the elephant, as some refer to it, India is the archer standing on a thin iceberg. IANS

Former UK official slams White House Advisor Navarro's anti-India tirade as 'shame'

WASHINGTON: Edward Price, a political economist and former head of Economic Policy in the British Consulate General in New York, has criticized the White House Senior Advisor Peter Navarro's tirade against India. calling it a "shame."

In an interview with IANS, Price asserted that Navarro's attempt to "instruct" a sovereign nation like India entirely "misses the point of diplo-

"It is also historically illiterate. India has always gone its own way, culturally, politically and otherwise. It is a unique country with a unique statecraft. We shouldn't be telling India what to do. We should be making it a fair and friendly offer," he added.

Navarro criticized India's foreign policy, questioning Prime Minister Narendra Modi's recent engagements with the Russian and Chinese leaders at the Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO) Summit, and declaring that "India needs to be with us, not Russia."

Price, who is currently an Adjunct Instructor at New York University, argued that currently there is a lack of policy "coherence" in the White

"The administration doesn't know whether its own views on India are its own views. There is no coherence in the White House. Wherever there are glimmers of an American grand strategy, for example, reducing trade exposure to China, Trump offers up immediate contradictions," he noted.

On the perception in the West that India is improving ties with Russia and China as a direct response to US pressures, Price asserted that "India is not closing ranks with anyone" and termed its foreign policy as "smart."

"Indian statecraft is smart, and Indians do not typically reduce their options on the global stage. Instead, India is reminding the Americans that they do indeed have options and India is a rising and sovereign country. Soon enough, India will be a Great Power. Washington D.C. is not the only story and India does not make decisions solely on the basis of American foreign policy," he explained.

Chips are digital diamonds, world ready to build semiconductor future with India: PM Modi

NEW DELHI: Prime Minister Narendra Modi inaugurated the 'Semicon India -2025', aimed at catalyzing India's Semiconductor ecosystem and said the world trusts India and is ready to build the semiconductor future with the country.

Remarking that in the world of semiconductors, it is often said, 'Oil was black gold, but chips are digital diamonds', the Prime Minister stated that oil shaped the previous century, and the fate of the world was determined by oil wells. The global He expressed confidence that, given the pace at which India is advancing in the semiconductor sector, India will hold a significant share in this \$1 trillion market.

PM Modi recalled that in 2021, the Semicon India program was launched, by 2023, India's first semiconductor plant had been approved, in 2024, several more plants received approval, and in 2025, five additional projects were cleared. He said ten semiconductor projects are now underway, involving an investment of over

Emphasizing that in the semiconductor sector, speed matters, PM Modi said, "the shorter the time from file to factory, and the lesser the paperwork, the sooner wafer work can begin". He stressed that the government is working with this very ap-





(FOG is under the umbrella of the FIA - the Federation of Indo-Americans of Northern California, a registered 501(c)(3) nonprofit.)

Recently, Dr. Japra has welcomed many complementary streams of healing, transforming the FOG Health Fair into a holistic wellness event.

Dr. Bhupinder Bhandari, a well-known gastroenterologist who also practices in Fremont, was the Chair of the Health Fair this year, just as in previous years.

Dr. Kavana Sanjay, a medical doctor from India, who is in the process of entering residency in the U.S., and Lakshmi lyer (this correspondent) acted as the Co-Chairs/ coordinators for the event, along with coordinator Sujata Shrivastava.

California shot back, stating its intent to roll out "trigger maps" with greater representation for Democrats, if any Republican state is successful in carving out new Congressional districts. Speakers at the Aug 22 conference discussed the redistricting process, the impact of the new maps, and whether votes from minority populations may be diluted as a result.

Rep. Gene Wu, Democratic leader in the Texas House of Representatives pointed out that, according to regulations, redistricting should only be conducted after the census. Texas completed its latest redistricting in 2021, but now it's changing the map again. He bluntly called it "changing the rules mid-game." He emphasized that Texas' African-American community has long amassed political power, but the

new map merges two African-American districts, leaving only one African-American congressman. Hispanic communities, on the other hand, have been fragmented, with votes being allocated to majority-white districts, significantly reducing their influence. He further argued that minorities already have distinct needs, such as Mexicans and Venezuelans within the Hispanic community, or different immi-

at the congressional level. "State legislatures and local districts are where the real voices are," he said. He urged the community to focus more on reforms at the local and state levels, "because while congressional districts get a lot of attention, it's often how state legislatures are drawn that truly impacts community representation."

grant groups. If they are fragmented into districts with disparate backgrounds, they will struggle to gain political support, "ultimately silencing the voices of these communities."

Sara Rohani, Assistant Counsel, NAACP Legal Defense Fund noted that smaller, more dispersed communities like Asian Americans and Native Americans may not be adequately represented eral Counsel, MALDEF noted that while the Asian population is not large enough to form a single-majority district in Texas, it is a significant component of "unified districts" in places like Austin. He added that if lawmakers were to inappropriately consider the race of Asian voters during redistricting, it would be unconstitutional.

Sam Wang, President of the Electoral Innovation Lab at Princeton University

noted that Texas's new map will give Republicans an additional five to seven seats, exceeding the "neutral gerrymander" benchmark and making it the most extreme case since 1972. He described Texas' lack of legal regulations as "the Wild West of redistricting." He explained that approximately 80% of US congressional districts are uncompetitive even under neutral gerrymandering, and that the truly influential elections are often primaries, not runoffs. While gerrymandering has decreased over the past decade thanks to independent commissions and court intervention, the Texas case still highlights the severity of the problem.

Wang specifically noted that smaller, more dispersed ethnic groups, such as Asian Americans and Native Americans, may not be adequately represented at the congressional level. "State legislatures and local districts are where they truly have a voice." He urged the community to focus more on reforms at the local and state levels, "because while congressional districts get the spotlight, it's often how state legislative lines are drawn that truly impacts community representation."

Durga Temple of Bay Area can get back on its feet," Krishnamoorthi said in a statement

On August 28, burglars targeted the temple in Santa Clara and stole its donation box and other ornaments. This was the second burglary at the temple after a similar incident in January 2024.

The Democratic House member from

Illinois highlighted the rise in attacks on Hindu temples across the United States, calling them "abhorrent acts of violence."

In Greenwood, Indiana, a temple was defaced in August with anti-India and anti-Hindu graffiti. In June, gunfire struck the Sri

Sri Radha Krishna Temple in Spanish Fork, Utah. And in March, a temple in Chino Hills, Southern California, was vandalized with similar anti-India messages.

On several occasions, the Indian government has voiced its protest against these attacks.

In March, Minister of State (MoS) for External

Affairs Kirti Vardhan Singh, in a written response in Parliament, revealed that India was in touch with US authorities over such instances.

"All incidents of attack and desecration of temples and places of worship in the US are immediately taken up with the US Government through diplomatic channels," the MoS replied. *IANS*



Over 100 cr people worldwide live with mental health disorder

NEW DELHI: More than 1 crore people globally live with a mental health disorder, and women account for over 53 percent, according to new data released recently by World Health Organization (WHO).

The WHO reports World Mental Health Today and Mental Health Atlas 2024 stated that conditions such as anxiety and depression inflict immense human and economic tolls and called for greater investment and action to scale up services to protect and promote people's mental health.

"Transforming mental health services is one of the most pressing public health challenges," said Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, WHO Director-General.

"Investing in mental health means investing in people, communities, and economies -- an investment no country can afford to neglect. Every government and every leader has a responsibility to act with urgency and to ensure that mental health care is treated not as a privilege, but as a basic right for all," he added.

The reports showed that anxiety and depressive disorders are the most common types of mental health disorders among both men and women. However, women are disproportionately impacted overall. *IANS*

Scientists find why ultra-processed diets make you gain fat even without extra calories: Study

WASHINGTON DC: An international team of scientists has now discovered that people gain more weight on an ultra-processed diet compared to a minimally processed diet, even when they eat the same number of calories.

The study in humans also revealed that a diet high in ultraprocessed foods introduces higher levels of pollutants that are known to affect sperm quality. The findings were published in the journal Cell Metabolism.

"Our results prove that ultraprocessed foods harm our reproductive and metabolic health, even if they're not eaten in excess. This indicates that it is the processed nature of these foods that makes them harmful," says Jessica Preston, lead author of the study, who carried out the research during her PhD at the University of Copenhagen's NNF Center for Basic Metabolic Research (CBMR).

To get the best possible data,

the scientists compared the health impact of unprocessed and ultra-processed diets on the same person. They recruited 43 men aged 20 to 35, who spent three weeks on each of the two diets, with three months 'washout' in between.

Half started on the ultra-pro-

they were on. Both the unprocessed and ultra-processed diets had the same amount of calories, protein, carbs and fats.

Men gained around 1 kg more of fat mass while on the ultraprocessed diet compared to the unprocessed diet, regardless of whether they were on the normal saw decreases in their levels of testosterone and follicle-stimulating hormone, which are crucial for sperm production.

"We were shocked by how many body functions were disrupted by ultra-processed foods, even in healthy young men. The long-term implications are alarm-



cessed and half started on the unprocessed diet. Half of the men also received a high-calorie diet with an extra 500 daily calories, while half received the normal amount of calories for their size, age and physical activity levels.

Zydus Lifesciences launches India's first trivalent flu vaccine

NEW DELHI: Zydus Lifesciences recently launched India's first trivalent influenza vaccine, aligning with the global recommendations of the World Health Organization (WHO).

Seasonal influenza viruses evolve rapidly, necessitating annual updates to vaccine compositions. The WHO, thus, recommended trivalent vaccines for use in the 2025-2026 Northern Hemisphere (NH) influenza season.

The new Vaxiflu-Trivalent Influenza Vaccine (TIV) is recommended for individuals aged 6 months and above. It will effectively protect strains such as an A/Victoria/4897/2022 (H1N1) pdm09-like virus; an A/Croatia/



10136RV/2023 (H3N2)-like virus; and a B/Austria/1359417/2021 (B/Victoria lineage)-like vi-

rus, stated the company.

Globally, the influenza vaccine is available as quadrivalent and trivalent formulations.

India earlier followed a quadrivalent flu vaccine regimen, which offered protection against these strains, as well as the influenza B Yamagata virus.

However, there has been no circulation of the influenza B Yamagata virus since March 2020, including in India. This indicates a very low risk of infection, rendering the inclusion of this strain in influenza vaccines no longer necessary. *IANS*

New drug shows promise for people with treatment-resistant hypertension


NEW DELHI: A new medication has been shown to significantly lower blood pressure in people whose levels stay dangerously high, despite taking several existing medicines, according to the results of a Phase III clinical trial.

Globally, around 1.3 billion people have high blood pressure (hypertension), and in around half of cases, the condition is uncontrolled or treatment-resistant. These individuals face a much greater risk of heart attack, stroke, kidney disease, and early death.

The international trial

showed that after 12 weeks, patients taking the new drug baxdrostat (1 mg or 2 mg once daily in pill form) experienced a blood pressure reduction of around 9-10 mmHg more than those taking the placebo -- a reduction large enough to cut cardiovascular risk potentially.

About 4 in 10 patients reached healthy blood pressure levels, compared with fewer than 2 in 10 on placebo, revealed the trial, led by University College London's Institute of Cardiovascular Science. *IANS*



Common heart attack drug may raise death risk in some women: Study

The Quality care you need

ACCEPTING NEW PATIENTS

NEW DELHI: Beta-blockers, the standard treatment after a heart attack for the last 40 years, may offer no benefit for heart attack patients and can raise death risk in some women, according to recent study that called for a rejig into the standard treatment paradigm.

Beta blockers are drugs commonly prescribed for a range of cardiac conditions, including heart attacks. It pro-

vides no clinical benefit for patients who have had an uncomplicated myocardial infarction with preserved heart function.

The study presented at the European Society of Cardiology Congress in Madrid and simultaneously published in The New England Journal of Medicine and in the European Heart Journal, showed that women treated with beta blockers had a higher risk of

death, heart attack, or hospitalization for heart failure compared to women not receiving the drug.

However, men did not have this increased risk.

"The study will reshape all international clinical guidelines," said senior investigator Valentin Fuster, President of Mount Sinai Fuster Heart Hospital.

"Currently, more than 80 percent of patients with uncomplicated myocardial infarction are discharged on beta

blockers. The findings represent one of the most significant advances in heart attack treatment in decades," said principal investigator Borja Ibáñez, Scientific Director at Centro Nacional de Investigaciones Cardiovasculares (CNIC) in Spain.

Although generally considered safe, beta blockers can cause side effects such as fatigue, bradycardia (low heart

rate), and sexual dysfunction.

The international study enrolled 8,505 patients across 109 hospitals in Spain and Italy. Participants were randomly assigned to receive or not receive beta blockers after hospital discharge. All patients otherwise received the current standard of care and were followed for a median of nearly four years.

The results showed no significant differences between the two groups in rates of death, recurrent heart attack, or hospitalization for heart failure.

A subgroup analysis found that women treated with beta blockers experienced more adverse events. Results show women treated with beta-blockers had a 2.7 percent higher absolute risk of mortality compared to those not treated with beta-blockers during the 3.7 years of follow-up of the study. *IANS*

India emerging as life sciences GCC hub, to enhance drug discovery, compliance: Report


NEW DELHI: With 23 of the world's top 50 life sciences companies establishing centers in the country, India has emerged as the global hub of Global Capability Centers (GCCs) for life sciences, as per recent report.

The report by advisory firm EY India showed that a majority of the companies established their presence in the country in the last five years. This is indicative of India's growing role in driving pharmaceutical research, innovation, and end-to-end value creation.

Notably, the life sciences GCCs have rapidly evolved from traditional back-office roles into strategic innovation engines.

Far from being limited to support functions, these centers now play a critical role in global mandates such as drug discovery, digital therapeutics, and real-world evidence (RWE) analytics, increasingly leveraging artificial intelligence to accelerate pipelines and drive patient-centric innovation, the report said.

"Our analysis highlights how India has rapidly evolved from a support base to the very center of innovation for global pharma and healthcare. In just five years, GCC penetration in enabling functions like finance, HR, supply chain, and IT has crossed about 60 percent," said Arindam Sen, Partner and GCC Sector Lead - Technology, Media & Entertainment and Telecommunications, EY India. *IANS*

Tesla's India sales fall short of expectations with around 600 orders

NEW DELHI: US auto giant Tesla's entry into the Indian market fell short of expectations, as the company received just over 600 orders since opening bookings in mid-July.

This figure is significantly lower compared to Tesla's global sales where it delivers the same number of vehicles every four hours, according to multiple reports.

The company now plans to ship 350 to 500 cars to India this year, with the first shipment from its Shanghai factory expected in early September, the report said.

"As a rising economic powerhouse and the most populous country and biggest democracy in the world, India has a special importance in a world region that is of strategic importance," he said.

Wadephul and S Jaishankar also discussed international challenges during the bilateral meeting. The German Foreign Minister stated that they expressed concern about China's increasingly aggressive behavior and aim to expand cooperation in the areas of defense, security, and armaments.

India and Germany are united by the objective to preserve the rules-based international order, and that includes the freedom of maritime trade routes in the Indo-Pacific. China's increasingly aggressive behavior in the Indo-Pacific is a cause for concern for both our countries. More generally, we aim to expand further our cooperation in the areas of defense, security and armament," he said.

"We talked about this today. Be that through the common exercise of our forces or speeding up the granting of the export license process for the Indo-Pacific engagement of last year's German frigate made a port call in India. We also talked

China can't beat India's growth, says ace investor Mark Mobius

NEW DELHI: Billionaire investor Mark Mobius has said that India remains the leading emerging market and China cannot surpass India's growth in the long run.

Mobius highlighted that despite US tariffs on Indian exports and short-term volatility, India's domestic demand, government reforms, and entrepreneurial resilience will maintain its lead over other emerging markets. The ace investor has invested nearly 20 percent of his portfolio in India.

In an interview with the Economic Times, he said that sectors like pharmaceuticals, gems, and apparel may be affected by US President Donald Trump's 50 percent tariff on exports. However, he believes Indian businesses can adapt by moving manufacturing to other markets such as Africa.

"Indian entrepreneurs are very creative. I think they will be able to get around some of these problems," Mobius said.

The billionaire investor said that the US government should not single out India for Russian oil imports, pointing out that China is purchasing a similar amount

Regarding US tariffs, he said, "At most, exports may shave off 0.5 percent to 0.75 percent from economic growth. But India's

domestic market is enormous and still expanding rapidly. Even if the growth estimate falls from 6 percent to 5.5 percent, it's not a big issue," he added.

The billionaire investor said that the US government should not single out India for Russian oil imports, pointing out that China is purchasing a similar amount. He suggested negotiations could resolve these differences, especially as global crude prices have dropped.

He also highlighted the weaker rupee as a positive for exporters and noted that government support measures will cushion the blow. "The Indian market looks healthy. The economy is still doing very well. Eventually, India and the US will reach an agreement because this situation cannot last long," Mobius noted. IANS

ChatGPT suffers global outage; users report glitches and missing chats

NEW DELHI: Users across the world faced disruptions while using ChatGPT on September 3, as the AI chatbot developed by OpenAI went down for a brief period.

Many people reported that they were unable to fetch responses, with some even claiming that their past conversations had disappeared.

According to Downdetector, which tracks online service disruptions, the outage peaked around 12:44 PM, with more than 500 reports coming from India alone.

Similar complaints were registered from other countries. While the website version was hit the hardest. app users also experienced problems accessing ChatGPT.

OpenAl has not yet released an official statement about the glitch. The chatbot has faced outages before, including two incidents in July that affected both casual users and professionals who rely on the tool every day.

Users took to social media to share their frustration. One user wrote, "There is a glitch today in ChatGPT. All of its replies have disappeared from all conversations!"

Another joked, "ChatGPT is down. You won't see some people today." Some expressed concern, saying they were unable to get work done without the chatbot.

Meanwhile, OpenAI announced it will introduce parental controls for ChatGPT after reports surfaced that the system allegedly encouraged a teenager to consider suicide.

The company said parents will soon be able to link their accounts with their teen's account and apply age-appropriate rules to the chatbot's responses.

Parents will also receive notifications if the system detects that a teen is experiencing acute distress.

"Within the next month, parents will be able to control how ChatGPT responds to their teen," OpenAl said in a blog post, adding that its reasoning models are more reliable in following safety guidelines.

"For now, ChatGPT services appear to have been restored, and users can log back in and continue using the platform," an X user said. IANS

FIR against agents for duping two men with fake Russia jobs

NEW DELHI: The Crime Branch of Delhi Police registered a First Information Report (FIR) against a group of agents accused of cheating two men under the guise of providing jobs in Russia.

The victims alleged that they were lured with promises of work but were later abandoned abroad.

According to the FIR filed by victim Pramod Chauhan, a resident of village Ranipur, Purandarapur police station, Maharajganj district, Uttar Pradesh, he had been working as a mason. He stated that he had previously worked in Saudi Arabia for 18 years, where he met Nizamuddin Akram Khan and developed trust in him.

Pramod said he contacted Nizamuddin again when he was looking for a job in Russia. He alleged that Nizamuddin promised him employment and, on June 30, handed him an appointment letter from a company named Haka Moscow near the Badarpur Border, However, he never showed his office or home and only displayed documents outdoors.

Pramod alleged that the agents told him he would receive a labor visa for Russia. Instead, he later found that they had provided him only a tourist visa.

"Deceived by their assurances, I and my neighbor Gautam Sahni paid a total of Rs 4,05,000 through UPI and Rs 50,000 in cash to these agents," the victim said. ANI

USCIS to modernize fee payments with electronic funds

WASHINGTON: U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services has implemented a new way to pay fees using electronic debit from a U.S. bank account. Effective immediately, individuals can make transactions directly to USCIS by completing and signing Form G-1650, Authorization for ACH Transactions, and filing it with their applications, petitions, or requests.

The move aligns with Executive Order 14247, Modernizing Payments to and from America's Bank Account, and is aimed at reducing the time and manpower required to process checks and money orders, as well as reducing the risks of fraud, lost payments, and theft.

"We have a responsibility to the American people to operate as efficiently and securely as possible," said USCIS Spokesman Matthew J. Tragesser. "Over 90% of our payments come from checks and money orders, causing processing delays and increasing the risk of fraud and lost payments. America deserves better, and we intend to deliver."

This new ACH debit payment

option is in addition to the existing option of paying by credit card using Form G-1450, giving individuals multiple options to pay required fees.

USCIS will continue to accept paper check and money order payments in addition to credit and debit payments until Oct. 28, 2025. After Oct. 28, USCIS will

accept only ACH debit transactions using Form G-1650 or credit card payments using Form G-1450.

USCIS has also issued updated guidance in the Policy Manual (PDF, 495.95 KB) to include ACH debit transactions using Form G-1650 as an acceptable form of payment.

Applicants and petitioners should ensure their accounts have sufficient funds to cover all filing fees. USCIS may reject any application, petition, or request if the transaction is denied. If you do not have a U.S. bank account you cannot use Form G-1650, but you may submit Form G-1450. Authorization for Credit Card Transactions. and use prepaid credit cards to pay filing fees. USCIS/Dtd. 08/29/2025

EU ministers urge US to reconsider visa ban on Palestinian officials

OSLO: European Union (EU) foreign ministers met in Copenhagen, where they unanimously urged the United States to reconsider its recent decision to deny entry visas to Palestinian officials.

The US Department of State said in a statement last week that it is "denying and revoking visas from members of the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO) and the Palestinian Authority (PA) ahead of the upcoming United Nations General Assembly."

On August 20, Germany's national broadcaster Deutschlandfunk (ARD) ran a five-minute radio feature about the Delhi event. The program, titled "Berlin statt Harvard: Indische Studierende an deutschen Unis" ("Berlin Instead of Harvard: Indian Students at German Universities"), highlighted why more Indian students are choosing Germany over the United States.

"For many Indian students, Germany has become the clear alternative to the U.S. -- world-class universities, no tuition fees, and strong career prospects make it the smarter choice." the broadcast observed.

A Shared Future

Indians travelling to US fall for 1st time in over 20 years, June numbers down 8 pc

NEW DELHI: For the first time since 2001, excluding the Covid-19 years, the number of Indians visiting the United States has fallen as 2.1 lakh Indians travelled there in June 2025, which is an 8 percent drop compared to 2.3 lakh in the same month last year, according to the US Commerce Department's National Travel and Tourism Office (NTTO).

The downward trend seems to be continuing in July as well, with provisional data showing a 5.5 percent decline compared to July 2024.

This slowdown is part of a broader global trend. NTTO data shows that overall international arrivals to the US also fell, with a 6.2 percent drop in June, 7 percent in May, 8 percent in March, and 1.9 percent in Feb-

Only January and April saw increases of 4.7 percent and 1.3 percent, respectively.

India continues to be the fourth largest source of international visitors to the US. Since Canada and Mexico share land borders with America, India ranks as the second largest overseas market after the UK, followed by Brazil in fifth place.

Together, these five countries contributed nearly 60 percent of all international arrivals to the US in June.

Traditionally, Indian travellers to the US include students, business professionals, and those visiting friends and relatives.

Leisure travel to America has always been less popular compared to destinations like Southeast Asia, the Middle East, and Europe.

The current slowdown is being seen most clearly among students, though experts believe that business and family visits could also be affected if visa delays and constraints continue. IANS



India's top 10 listed developers may achieve booking target of Rs 1.49 lakh crore in FY26: Report



NEW DELHI: India's top 10 listed developers have achieved nearly 30 percent, or Rs 44,317 crore, of their total booking (presales guidance) targets of Rs 1,49,108 crore in FY 2026 in the first quarter of the fiscal, a recent report said.

"They are on track to achieve their booking targets of over Rs 1.49 lakh crore in FY 2026," ANAROCK Research said in a report. The top 10 listed developers' booking targets in FY 2025 stood at around Rs 1,20,818 crore. In short, they are targeting a 23 percent pre-sales growth over FY25 in the current fiscal year, the report stated.

According to the report, the actual annual sales bookings in FY 2025, Godrej Properties led the pack in the last fiscal with presales of nearly Rs 29,444 crore, followed by DLF, with sales bookings of around Rs 21,233 crore.

"Players like DLF Ltd and Prestige Estates are cases in point - DLF has hit nearly 52 percent of its total pre-sales target of Rs 20,000-22,000 crore for FY 2026 in Q1 FY2026," says Anuj Puri, Chairman, ANAROCK Group.

After the NBFC crisis in 2018 and the ensuing pandemic disruptions, developers faced funding crunches and declining sales.

Many, especially the large and listed ones, focused on deleveraging, improving presales, monetizing assets, and raising equity capital. As a result, several top developers have brought down their net debt-to-equity ratios, with some even achieving net cash positions, a report said.

However, the real estate sector's shift from leverage-led to balance-sheet-led growth marks a pivotal shift in its investment appeal and operating model.

"With near-zero debt levels, improving buyer sentiment, and favorable monetary policy positions, FY26 sees the industry in

a stable, trust-driven, performance-led cycle that has long-term potential," the report stated.

"This deleveraging phase will positively impact real estate development in India over the long term. With D/E ratios at multiyear lows and equity capital continuing to flow in, developers can expand strategically, consolidate market share, and build consumer trust," Puri added.

The improved financial metrics also make the Indian real estate sector more attractive to institutional and foreign investors, which bodes well for capital formation in the medium term. *IANS*

India's aim to build 1 million homes in Australia can be biggest housing collaboration in history

NEW DELHI: Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal recently said that the government is engaged in "deep negotiations" with Australia regarding a proposal to construct one million homes estimated at \$500 billion. If realized, this can herald one of the largest international housing collaborations in recent history.

The minister said the scale of the project requires global partnerships, and he has reached out to the UAE to help on the financial front.

According to a report in The Australia Today, Goyal's comments place the proposal at the intersection of India's ambitions to export skilled labor, Australia's urgent need for new housing, and the UAE's appetite for global invest-

Master Builders Australia has warned that the National Housing Accord is falling further behind schedule, "with its latest forecasts showing a deepening shortfall in new home construction".

The national voice of the \$200 billion building and construction industry, Master Builders Australia represents eight state and territory Master Builders Associations and 32,000 members nationwide.

Rising costs, falling productivity, lengthy build times and workforce shortages are preventing builders from keeping pace with demand, despite strong willingness from the industry to deliver, the organization has warned.

"Australian builders are keen to get on with the job, but under current conditions, the Accord's 1.2 million home goal looks less achievable every day," said Master Builders CEO Denita Wawn in a statement.

It also revealed that 180.500 homes are expected to be



started in 2024-25, nearly 60,000 short of the Accord's annual target of 240,000. Over the full five-year period, the shortfall has now widened to 180,200 homes compared with the 160,000 projected in April.

Addressing the 'Bharat Buildcon 2026' conference in Mumbai late last month, Goyal drew attention to the acute housing shortage in Australia, where nearly 1 million homes are required.

He invited Indian businesses, workers, and experts to

seize this opportunity, stating that Australia is open to financial collaboration, technical expertise, and workforce support from India.

Training and certification opportunities are also being offered so Indian professionals can meet Australian standards. "If we miss this opportunity, we will have only ourselves to blame," he remarked, calling it a potential gamechanger for India's construction and financial sectors. IANS

Rise in household loans gathers pace in S. Korea despite real estate curb

SEOUL: Household loans extended by South Korean banks added more than 4 trillion won (\$2.87 billion) in August, data showed on Sunday (31 August), despite aggressive restrictions implemented earlier in the year to curb rising household debt and housing prices.

Household loans extended by banks increased 4.2 trillion won this month as of 28 September, sharply up from the 2.2 trillion won on-month growth in July, which marked the smallest increase since March, reports Yonhap news agency.

In an effort to curb rising household debt and housing prices, authorities in late June imposed a 600 million-won cap on mortgage loans for property purchases in the capital region, while suspending home-backed loans for multihomeowners.

The growth picked up in August due to a rise in unsecured and other types of household loans.

While the government believes the latest restrictions have eased the market's overheating to some extent, it is mulling additional regulations for the real estate market, including tightening the loan-to-value (LTV) ratio, according to market observers.

The LTV ratio is a key regulatory tool used to curb

household loans, as it limits the maximum amount homeowners can borrow based on the value of their collateral.

The ratio is currently set at 50 percent for anti-specu-



lation areas in Seoul, with market watchers anticipating a tighter 40 percent ceiling.

Lee Eog-weon, the nominee for chairman of the Financial Services Commission, said the government will continue to monitor the housing market and take additional measures when necessary.

"There are many analyses the measures implemented on June 27 were successful in the short term amid rising household debt driven by mortgages in the greater Seoul area," Lee said in a written statement submitted to parliament for his confirmation hearing.

"However, there are also opinions that only regulating loans can limit the policy's effectiveness," Lee said. "When I take office, I will pay special attention to the mat-

ter and carry out my duties."

Lee added that the government needs to take "comprehensive consideration" amid the outlook that Seoul may seek to apply tightened curbs on loans for "jeonse."

Jeonse refers to a unique Korean system in which renters give landlords a large returnable deposit instead of paying monthly rent.

"We will monitor trends in the housing market and household loans and immediately implement measures currently under preparation when necessary," Lee added, noting that nothing has been decided on additional regulations.

Meanwhile, net interest margins of South

Korea's top five banks, the difference between interest received and paid, approached the highest levels since 2022, when financial regulators made public disclosure mandatory. IANS

What is taking away human attention is simply their own cerebral activity. People do not know how to handle their memory and their attention separately. Their memory always floods into their attention and clouds it all the time.



What is worth your attention and what is not-this is a wrong way to look at life.



India can be the balancer in reshaping global governance

ndia is proving that partnership with the United States does not mean surrender. By defending its farmers, protecting core industries, and refusing to bend on sovereignty, India is standing up to U.S. pressure with confidence. This is good for India, because it safeguards livelihoods and ensures long-term economic resilience. It is good for the world, because it strengthens multipolarity and shows that no nation, however powerful, can dictate terms unchallenged. A self-reliant, assertive India is not just rising - it is reshaping global balance for the better.

What we're seeing is really an India-Trump discord, not a breakdown of India-U.S. relations. Trump is temporary and his presidency is bound by term limits and domestic U.S. politics. Midterms and the next election cycle could change the policy mood in Washington. India-U.S. relations are deeper and they rest on long-term stra-

India-U.S. relations are deeper and they rest on long-term strategic, economic, and people-to-people ties (IT, diaspora, defense cooperation, Indo-Pacific strategy). These won't vanish because of one leader's negotiating style

tegic, economic, and people-to-people ties (IT, diaspora, defense cooperation, Indo-Pacific strategy). These won't vanish because of one leader's negotiating style. India is pushing back against Trump's specific demands on farm, dairy, and trade imbalances, but that doesn't mean it is turning away from America. It simply means India won't compromise on its red lines.

It is best to see this phase in India-US relations as a temporary friction with a current transient phase of transactional relations not based on principles of equality and fairness.

Not Anyone's Pawn

India is framing its policies from India's interests, not from US/EU perspectives. While highlighting the multipolar dynamics (India, BRICS, Global South, Africa, Latin America) as equally important players shaping the world order, India is not sugarcoating US arm-twisting while avoiding unnecessary rhetoric in retaliation.

India is placing its actions in a global

context (e.g., how EU, China, ASEAN respond to similar US demands) so it's clearer that India is not "out of line" but part of a broader balancing trend.

India has made it clear that it will not be anyone's pawn. If the West wants India to play the role of a balancer in the emerging world order, then it must engage with India in terms of equality, not condescension. That means respecting India's sovereignty, not dictating whom it can trade with or what weapons it can buy. It means offering fair market access instead of pushing onesided concessions that endanger Indian farmers and workers. It means sharing advanced technologies through real partnerships, not guarded licenses. It means consulting India on global rules - from climate change to digital governance - as a rulesetter, not just an invitee.

A confident, autonomous India strengthens multipolarity, ensures stability in Asia,

and prevents the world from tilting into any one country's hegemony - American, Chinese, or otherwise. If the West truly values India as a balancer, then it must treat India with respect due to a pole of power in its own right.

West Needs India

The West needs India today more than India needs

the West. This leverage is being used with clarity and confidence. India is ready to cooperate where it gains - in technology transfers, defense co-production, green energy, and access to Western markets. But India must draw uncompromising red lines on agriculture, dairy, pharmaceuticals, and strategic autonomy in foreign policy.

India, by its action, is messaging to be treated as an equal pole in the global order, not as a counterweight or client. That means demanding fair trade terms, pushing for permanent UN Security Council reform, and ensuring the Global South's voice is heard in global financial and climate negotiations. At the same time, India is deepening ties with Russia, the Middle East, Africa, and ASEAN, so no bloc can ever hold it hostage.



Many devotees also tonsure their heads as an offering to Lord Venkateswara Swamy once their wish is fulfilled or to get rid of their sins and ego. It is done free of cost at Kalyanakatta buildings. Another popular ritual at Tirupati Temple is Thulabaram, wherein a devotee sits on one side of the weighing balance scale. In contrast, the other side is filled with materials (like sugar, jaggery, tulsi

leaves, banana, gold, and coins) more than the weight of the devotee. This ritual is mostly performed with children and infants.

The non-stop chanting of 'Om Namo Venkatesaya,' the mad pilgrim rush, and the 8-feet tall idol of Lord Venkateshwara - everything about the Sri Venkateshwara Temple is majestic. Spread over

an area of 26 kilometers and is visited by nearly 50,000 pilgrims daily. The Padmavathi Temple, dedicated to Goddess Padmavati, consort of Lord Venkateswara, is situated at Tiruchanoor in Tirupati town. Many devotees believe they should visit Goddess Padmavati and seek her blessings before visiting Lord Venkateswara Swamy at Tirumala. www.holidify.com

Bangladesh's justice on trial: When victims become criminals

hen it comes to democratic dysfunc tion, the fiasco of the 'Mancha 1971' meeting in Dhaka on August 28, 2025 deserves a place among the most ruinous acts of self-sabotage. The facts are as troubling as they are revealing: a group of self-styled "July Fighters" stormed a discussion commemorating the Liberation War, heckled the speakers, confined participants, and vandalized banners. Their targets were not radicals plotting insurrection in secret but freedom fighters, intellectuals, and even a former Awami League minister, Latif Siddique.

One would expect the state to

other mob-that their violence will be tolerated, even rewarded, if it serves political convenience. It legitimizes the heckler's veto: shout loudly enough, disrupt forcefully enough, and the state will not only look the other way but hand over your opponents to the police.

This, in turn, creates a vicious cycle. Each disruption emboldens the next, each mob grows bolder than the last, and the line between dissent and disorder collapses. A fragile democracy cannot survive when its police force acts less like guardians of law and more like errand boys for whichever group shouts the loudest.

The decision to arrest the organizers rather than the attackers is more than a bureaucratic misstep. It is a dangerous signal. It tells the "July Fighters"-or any other mob-that their violence will be tolerated, even rewarded, if it serves political convenience

act as an arbiter of law, restraining the aggressors and protecting the right to free assembly. Instead, the opposite occurred. The police, far from dispersing the disruptors, detained the victims. Sixteen participants, including Siddique, now face charges under the Anti-Terrorism Act, with allegations that they sought to destabilize the state and launch an armed struggle against the interim government. Courts have compounded the absurdity by denying bail, treating a peaceful discussion on the Constitution and the Liberation War as if it were a jihadist cell plotting insurrection.

This is not justice. It is a parody of justice.

The Lie of "Terrorism"

The charges filed against the detainees deserve not only dismissal but outright ridicule. To allege that Latif Siddique-an aging politician with a record of blunt speech but no credible history of militancy-was plotting armed insurrection is to stretch the imagination into the realm of farce. It is a state-sponsored lie, reminiscent of the discredited practices under the Awami League government, when opposition rallies were broken up with fabricated cases and dissenters were labeled enemies of the state.

The Anti-Terrorism Act, designed to confront real threats to national security, is being wielded as a cudgel against political expression. By doing so, the government devalues the law itself. When everything becomes "terrorism," nothing is. This is not only an affront to due process but also a strategic

blunder. It blurs the distinction between genuine extremists, who deserve the full weight of the law, and political critics, who deserve protection. The result: the state weakens its own credibility and erodes public trust.

Echoes of the Past

Bangladesh has been here before. Under the ousted regime, fraudulent cases were the norm; the magistrates were pliant, the police complicit, and dissent criminalized. The current government, by repeating the same tactics, undermines its claim to represent a break from the past. What, after all, is the substantive difference between yesterday's suppression of BNP gatherings and today's crackdown on the 'Mancha 1971'? The uniforms may be the same, the rhetoric recycled, the targets shifted, but the underlying principle (political convenience over constitutional rights) remains depressingly identical.

And therein lies the danger. When interim governments mimic the abuses of elected ones, they forfeit legitimacy faster than they accumulate it.

Against Spirit of 1971

The irony, of course, is painful. The 'Mancha 1971' discussion was centered on the very spirit of the Liberation War-on freedom, constitutional integrity, and national identity. By allowing mobs to disrupt the event and then punishing the victims, the government has created the impression that it is not only indifferent to the spirit of 1971 but actively hostile to it. The Awami League, predictably, has seized on this narrative, painting the interim administration as "anti-liberation." What better gift could the government have handed its most determined political rival?

The recent meeting of Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi; Chinese president, Xi Jinping; and Russian president, Vladimir Putin could be the turning point of global power shifts, and end up with Washington loosing its leadership of last century.

Modi's visit to Tianjin for a regional security summit comes days after the US doubled tariffs on Indian exports to 50%, citing New Delhi's refusal to stop buying Russian oil.

Washington has pointed to India's continuing purchase of Russian crude oil and defense hardware, as reason for the tariff increase, arguing that Delhi is helping fund Moscow's war on Ukraine. Modi maintains a balance over the Ukraine war, refusing to criticize Moscow directly while urging peace.

The row has upended years of deepening cooperation between India and the US, built on technology and a shared determination to counter Beijing's global ambitions. It has also forced India to aggressively look elsewhere to diversify its trade.

"Indian trust in the US is shattered," the South Asia analyst Michael Kugelman said. "I'm not sure whether US officials fully realize how much trust they have squandered in such a short time."

India has consistently defended its Russian oil purchase, saying they are vital to keep energy costs stable in the vast developing economy, help steady prices globally and comply with international law.

The economic blow of the tariffs is immense. The US is India's biggest export market at \$86.5bn a year, and two-thirds of that about \$60.2bn in goods - is subject to the new duties, hitting laborintensive sectors from textiles to jewelry.

There is a historical mistrust between both China and India with occasional border clashes. However, Beijing may see a golden opportunity to warm up ties with India and work out issues, which will strengthen their common differences with Washington on tariff issues.

Russia, too, stands to benefit from India's rift with the US, with Delhi seeing the relationship as more vital than ever for balancing ties with the west, diversifying military hardware purchases and ensuring energy security.

Indian officials assert Delhi wishes to continue its ties with the US, but also needs to "diversify its partnerships". India cannot "afford to appear as though it is giving in to US pressure on oil imports, or anything else that could be construed as a capitulation and public anger is high," said one official who could not be named.

To offset the US tariffs, India has already stated rolling out an export drive across 40 countries from the UK to South Korea to boost its textile trade. According to sources, Japanese companies are also set to invest up to \$68bn in India in the next decade.

India is believed to hold substantial deposits of rare earths used in everything from smartphones to solar panels but lacks technology to mine and process them extensively. Trump's tightening of H1-B holders may also be another shift, which will reinforce tech support that India lacks.

In short term Trump's policy on tariff may gain billions as claimed but in long term America will loose its economic power to the Eastern block. India and China, both have the largest human resource in labor and robust domestic markets.


