



PM Modi dials Putin, congratulates Russian President on his 73rd birthday

MOSCOW/NEW DELHI: Prime Minister Narendra Modi held a telephone conversation with the Russian President Vladimir Putin, during which he also congratulated him on 7 October, his 73rd birthday, and conveyed best wishes for his good health and success in all his endeavors.

The two leaders reviewed the progress in the bilateral agenda, and reaffirmed their commitment to further deepen the Special and Privileged Strategic Partnership between India and Russia.

PM Modi conveyed that he is looking forward to welcoming President Putin to India, in December for the 23rd India-Russia Annual Summit.

India and Russia marked the 25th anniversary of the Declaration of Strategic Partnership between both countries on October 3.

The Declaration on Strategic Partnership signed by former Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee and Russian President Vladimir Putin on October 3, 2000, took the bilateral relations of India and Russia to a new level characterized by coordinated approaches towards ensuring international peace and security, addressing major global and regional issues, as well as close cooperation in economic, cultural,

Tianjin. Later this year, we look forward to the upcoming bilateral summit in New Delhi, which will coincide with the 15th anniversary of elevating our strategic partnership to the level of a 'special and privileged' relationship," stated Denis Alipov, the Russian Ambassador to India.

On the same day, Putin strongly

"The year 2025 has already been rich with numerous bilateral exchanges and a particularly warm and substantial engagement of our leaders at the recent Shanghai Cooperation Organization summit in backed India's decision to continue its oil trade with Moscow, while praising Prime Minister Modi's leadership.

Speaking at the Valdai Discussion Club in Sochi, Putin praised PM Modi as a "balanced and wise leader" and emphasized

the unique bond between the two countries.

Putin dismissed any political motivation behind India's purchase of Russian crude oil, asserting that it is driven purely by economics.

"There is no political aspect here... If India refuses our energy supplies, it will suffer certain losses. Estimates vary; some say it could be around \$9-10 billion. But if it doesn't refuse, sanctions will be imposed, and the loss will be the same. So why refuse if it also carries domestic political costs?" he said.

Putin had further expressed confidence in India's resilience and its refusal to bend under external pressure, saying, "Of course, the people of a country like India, believe me, will closely monitor the decisions made by the political leadership and will never allow any humiliation in front of anyone. And then, I know Prime Minister Modi; he himself would never take any steps of this kind." *IANS*

'Opportunities waiting to be seized are unparalleled...": 125-strong delegation marks largest ever UK govt trade mission to India

LONDON: UK PM Keir Starmer's trade mission to India is set to boost ties with one of the country's most important economic partners, as a delegation of 125 of the UK's most prominent CEOs, leading entrepreneurs, university Vice Chancellors and cultural institutions are accompanying the UK PM on this historic visit, an official statement noted.

As per the statement, following the signature of the landmark UK-India trade deal in July, which will lower tariffs on British goods being imported into India, the door is now open for British businesses to turbocharge their trade with India, one of the fastest growing economies in the world.

As per the statement, major household names such as Rolls Royce, British Telecom, Diageo, London Stock Exchange and British Airways will join the UK PM's delegation as he promises to secure opportunities for them to grow and expand into the Indian market - delivering growth and supporting jobs at home.

Notably, growing SMEs and entrepreneurs from every region of the UK will also travel with the Prime Minister, recognizing that the trade deal will break down barriers and support businesses of all shapes and sizes to trade more easily with India.

"The trade deal has been acknowledged as the best agreement ever secured by any country with India. Under current projections, the deal is expected to raise bilateral trade by £25.5 billion per year, with UK exports to India projected to grow by nearly 60%. It significantly improves market access for businesses in both countries, leading to cheaper products and services for consumers", the statement said.

British Prime Minister Keir Starmer said, "We signed a major trade deal with India in July - the best secured by any country - but the story doesn't stop there...It's not just a piece of paper, it's a launchpad for growth. With India set to be the third biggest economy in the world by 2028, and trade with them about to become guicker and cheaper, the opportunities waiting to be seized are unparalleled."

The statement further noted that with the deal, India's average tariff on UK products will drop from 15% to 3% - which means British companies selling products to India, from soft drinks and cosmetics to cars and medical devices, will find it easier to sell to the Indian market.

"The deal particularly benefits SMEs, as improved customs and digital commitments will make trade quicker, cheaper, and easier. In addition, bespoke support for SMEs, such as dedicated contact points, will help them enter the Indian market", the statement added.

On the education front, "14 university Vice Chancellors will also join the delegation in recognition of the explosion in demand for higher education in India - with 70 million places needed by 2035, which has created a huge opportunity for UK universities seeking new funding streams", the statement said.

It highlighted that some of the UK's biggest cultural institutions such as the British Film Institute and the National Theatre will also join the trip - opening new doors for creative exports, co-productions, museum and heritage partnerships, talent exchange, and joint initiatives across film, fashion, sport, and digital culture.

In a post on X, the British PM said, "I'm flying the flag for British business in Mumbai, because growth in India for British businesses means more jobs for people at home."

Meanwhile, British Airways has confirmed it will introduce a third daily flight between Delhi and London Heathrow in 2026, subject to regulatory and capacity approval, and will look for further growth opportunities in the country as trade between the UK and India increases.

Sean Doyle, Chairman and Chief Executive of British Airways, said, "I am delighted to take part in this important trade mission. Our ties with India were established over 100 years ago and today we have around 2,500 British Airways colleagues based there. We've been steadily increasing capacity between India and the UK over the years and we're now operating 56 direct services from five Indian cities each week." ANI

India should get rightful place in UNSC: UK PM Keir Starmer

MUMBAI: UK Prime Minister Keir Starmer on Thursday said New Delhi should get its 'rightful place' on the UN Security Council, highlighting India's remarkable growth story and its potential to play a key role in global affairs.

In his statement after meeting Prime Minister Narendra Modi at Raj Bhavan here, he made a strong pitch for India to get permanent membership in the UNSC.

"We want to see India taking its rightful place in the UNSC," he remarked.

His stance aligns with that of various nations, including the US, Germany, France and Japan, who have strongly supported India's UNSC bid.

The UK PM's statement also reflects a growing recognition of India's importance in global governance and its contribution to multilateralism. PM Starmer's support this afternoon echoes remarks from September last year, when the then US President Biden, French Prime Minister Emmanuel Macron, and he backed India, within days of each other, to make the UN a "more representative body" by including India and Germany, Japan, and Brazil.

Russia has also backed India's bid last month after Russian Foreign Minister

Sergey Lavrov said his country supports greater representation from Asia, Africa, and Latin America in the global body.

"The UK and India stand side-by-side as global leaders in tech and innovation. We are announcing a deal to make Bollywood films in the UK after a fantastic visit to the studio vesterday, and with our deepening cooperation in education," said the PM Starmer.

UK PM Starmer said he has brought "the largest trade delegation for a decade" to India, highlighting the major business and investment opportunities being explored during his visit. He added his visit to India aims to "double down" on the trade partnership between the two countries, calling the bilateral trade deal a key part of their growing relationship.

He also lauded the Gaza peace deal. "I strongly welcome the news that a deal has been reached on the first stage of the Peace Plan in Gaza. This is a moment of profound relief. The UK will support these crucial immediate steps and the next stages of the talks to ensure full implementation of the Peace Plan." IANS



US shutdown hits air travel as deadlock continues

WASHINGTON: The US government shutdown has entered its seventh day, with flight delays reported across multiple airports nationwide.

Flights were delayed at airports in New York, Denver and Los Angeles due to shortages of air traffic controllers. Staffing shortages are also being reported in Washington, DC, Newark, New Jersey, and Jacksonville, Florida.

A pilot was preparing to take off from Hollywood Burbank Airport in California recently and radioed the air



"These moments are difficult. I think for the diaspora, looking at these last few months, the thing that they probably ask themselves is, how can they be effective? How can they be helpful? How can they be constructive? And sometimes, in moments like this, it's better to engage in quiet diplomacy," he added.

Keshap also spoke about the recent H-1B visa crackdown from the Trump administration, calling it a decision "driven by domestic politics."

"I think in a country as diverse and as layered as India, a democracy as well, Indians would understand that there are domestic political compulsions that may change how the United States interfaces with the world," he noted. IANS

'Find your ally' legal lifeline for undocumented students at community colleges

s immigration debates continue to shape the national landscape, California Community Colleges are stepping up to ensure students and their families have the support they need to pursue their dreams. Through Find Your Ally (findyourally.com) and the Higher Education Legal Services Project, every student in our system whether full-time or part-time, enrolled in credit, noncredit, dual enrollment, or adult education has access to free, high-quality immigration legal assistance. This includes help with applications, family petitions, consultations, and even coverage of DACA renewal fees. This is the first state-funded effort of its kind in the nation, ensuring that no student has to navigate complex immigration challenges alone. It reflects our system's commitment to advancing equity, breaking down barriers, and creating pathways for students to thrive both inside and outside the classroom.

In the ACom briefing on October 2, cosponsored by the Immigrant Legal Resource Center (ILRC) and the Foundation for California Community Colleges (FoundationCCC), college leaders and immigration legal experts highlighted the services making the biggest difference for immigrant communities and explored the ongoing legal challenges that shape their futures.

According to reports, there are 2.1 million students enrolled in California Community Colleges across the state, of which about 35,000 are undocumented immigrant students. The program is open to all community college students, whether full-time, part-time, credit or non-credit course learners, or even adult education or dual credit course students, regardless of immigration status. In addition, campus faculty and staff also benefit.

Alonso Garcia, Senior Manager, Equity, Foundation for California Community Colleges said this program is unique

to California and invests more than \$10 million every year to ensure that students can obtain legal aid without financial burden. Garcia pointed out at the press conference that the project cooperates with the Immigration Legal Resource Center and ten trustworthy legal

temporary exit permits, and related legal consultations. All consultation processes are strictly confidential. Students can make an appointment with a lawyer through a multilingual online platform, and some campuses also provide faceto-face services.

aid agencies to ensure comprehensive and professional service coverage. To date, more than a thousand students have directly benefited. Specialized services include green card and naturalization applications, family reunification, During the discussion, experts pointed out that California is the only state in the United States that provides such comprehensive legal support in the college system. This initiative not only helps undocumented students, but also provides

critical assistance to many international students and family members. "For many young people, this is the guarantee that they can continue to pursue their education and future dreams." In addition to legal assistance, the program works closely with mental health, financial aid and student affairs departments on campus to establish a comprehensive support network for students. For example, if some students encounter application fee problems during the application process, the project can provide fee reductions or subsidies to ease their financial pressure.

The Higher Education Legal Services Plan not only protects students' rights and interests, but also embodies the fairness and inclusion of California's higher education system. Yadira Gutierrez Vargas said, "I hope that through this service, every student, regardless of their status, can feel at ease on the road to pursuing their dreams."

Assembly Bill 268 making Diwali a State Holiday in California

ndiaspora proudly congratulates California Governor Gavin Newsom on signing Assembly Bill 268, officially designating Diwali as a state holiday. This landmark legislation marks a historic moment for Indian Americans, especially in California, and is a powerful recognition of the community's rich cultural heritage and longstanding contributions to the Golden State.

For the more than one million Indian Americans who call California home, this is a moment of immense pride and joy. Indian Americans have been instrumental in shaping California's vibrant and diverse landscape-contributing to the economy, serving in government, enriching the arts, sciences, and civic life, and uplifting communities across the state. In October 2024, Pennsylvania became the first state to declare Diwali an official public holiday. New York City took

a groundbreaking step by mandating public school closures for Diwali, with November 1, 2024 marking the first time schools were officially closed for the festival. Several school districts across New York State, beyond New York City, will also observe Diwali as an official holiday.

Today, with California-the most populous state in the nation-officially recognizing Diwali, Indian Americans celebrate a major milestone in the ongoing journey toward greater cultural inclusion and visibility. This recognition reflects not just the vibrancy of Diwali, but the enduring impact of the Indian American community across the United States. Immigrant detention camps

ifteen immigrants have died in immigration detention so far this year, ten of them between January and June, making that period the deadliest in recent history. Some of these deaths were suicides. More than 1,200 people are allegedly missing from the infamous and controversial Everglades facility dubbed "Alligator Alcatraz," with families and attorneys unable to locate them. Advocates report that children are being subjected to prolonged detention under harmful conditions, and that reports of overcrowding, unsanitary facilities, and problems with food and health care access are multiplying. There are currently close to 60,000 detainees, a record number, and the rapid expansion of arrests and detention, combined with diminishing transparency, signals a worsening situation for immigrants, most of who have not been convicted of any crime. Our panelists today discussed these issues and provided the best information available.

Heather Hogan, Policy and Practice Counsel, American Immigration Lawyers Association (AILA) said she had served as an asylum review officer in detention cen-

ters in Arizona and Texas and witnessed detainees being treated like criminals. "They were woken up at three in the morning, put on handcuffs and shackles, and orange prison uniforms, and were marched into the interview room like prisible Fear) interview, which is a part of political asylum", which deeply shocked her colleagues. She pointed out that authorities often put people who have attempted suicide, transgender people or people living with HIV into solitary confinement in the name of protection. Detention has gradually become a tool of punishment rather than a means of immigration management.

Andrew Free, Atlanta-based lawyer; founded #DetentionKills, to support families and communities affected by deaths in DHS custody pointed out that based on his comparison with the Deportation Data Program, 22 people have died in ICE custody this year, making it the deadliest year since the COVID-19 pandemic. He also found that at least five deaths were never announced by the government, and that more than 400 deaths may have been concealed since 2009. Free said Georgia's Stewart Detention Center has been the nation's deadliest facility for many years, and "many of those who died by suicide or due to delays in medical care. He added that although ICE releases death data more often than some prison systems, there is still a lack of transparency.

Indian-American community hails California's recognition of Diwali as state holiday

CALIFORNIA: Several members of the Indian-American community and advocacy organizations in the United States have voiced their appreciation as California officially designated Diwali-- the 'Festival of Lights'-- as a statewide holiday.

The bill was signed into law on October 6, making California the third state to declare the festival a statewide holiday, following Pennsylvania in 2024 and Connecticut earlier this year.

Extending greetings to all celebrating Diwali, the Indian Consulate General in San Francisco expressed gratitude to the State of California for adding the festival of lights to the list of state holidays.

"California now joins Pennsylvania and Connecticut in celebrating this festival that symbolizes light, hope, and unity -- values cherished across communities," the Indian Consulate General in San Francisco posted on X.

Meanwhile, advocacy group Coalition of Hindus of North America (CoHNA) thanked California Governor Gavin Newsom for recognizing the important festival and ushering in a new era of inclusion for Hindus in California.

It also appreciated Assembly Members Darshana Patel and Ash Kalra for sponsoring the bill.

Additionally, the Hindu American Foun-

dation (HAF) said the law sets a new precedent for the integration of Diwali into the holiday season in California.

HAF and the Hindu American community expressed hope that other states will follow California's example.

"We are grateful to Assembly member Kalra and Assembly member Patel for their leadership on this initiative, as well as the overwhelming support from the community," stated managing director of HAF, Samir Kalra.

"The provisions that allow students to take the day off without repercussion and state employees to take paid leave are important leaps forward in making

On the other hand, lauding California for the decision, Vishwa Hindu Parishad of America (VHPA) called it a proud and historic

milestone for Hindu Americans.

Diwali -- the festival of light, knowledge, and renewal -- speaks to values cherished by all communities. Its inclusion in California's official calendar reflects how these timeless ideals contribute to the state's vibrant and diverse spirit," VHPA posted on X. IANS

Indian Embassy in Doha assists repatriation of elderly man after in-flight stroke

NEW DELHI: The Indian embassy in Doha, in close coordination with the Indian Community Benevolent Forum (ICBF), successfully facilitated the safe repatriation of an elderly Indian national who suffered a stroke mid-flight while transiting through Qatar.

The man was travelling from the United Kingdom to India when he had a medical emergency during the flight. After landing in Doha, he was admitted to Hamad Medical Corporation (HMC) for treatment.

"Embassy of India, Doha, in coordination with ICBF, is happy to report the safe repatriation of an elderly person (who had a mid-flight emergency) back to Bharat. This elderly person had a stroke in flight while he was on transit from the UK to Bharat via Doha, Qatar," the embassy stated.

"Due to this emergency situation, he was admitted to Hamad Medical Corporation (HMC). Constant care by the Labor Wing of the Indian Embassy and ICBF during his entire stay in Doha made his life easy in a foreign land," the statement added.

The Embassy thanked ICBF volunteers, doctors, paramedics and Qatar Airways for their support in this humanitarian mission.

"End-to-end care by Embassy and ICBF included coordination with the insurance agency, assurance of immediate financial support if needed, help in getting a fitness certificate to fly back to Bharat and facilitation up to airport immigration. We thank the Indian Community Benevolent Forum (ICBF), Doctors and Paramedics in Hamad and Qatar Airways for their support in this humanitarian mission," the embassy said.

Meanwhile, Union Minister of Commerce and Industry Piyush Goyal is currently in Qatar, holding talks with leaders to boost trade ties between the two countries during his two-day visit to the Gulf country.

He will also hold meetings with the industry and business community. "I have scheduled discussions on a wide range of topics with Qatar and meetings with the industry and business community," the Union Minister told reporters.

During his visit, Goyal will co-chair a meeting of the Qatar-India Joint Commission on Trade and Commerce.

The meeting will also be co-chaired by Sheikh Faisal bin Thani bin Faisal Al Thani, Minister of Commerce and Industry of Qatar. ANI

'Ebola virus strain found in semen, breast milk months after infection'

NEW DELHI: US researchers have detected the Sudan Ebola virus strain in semen and breast milk among survivors, about eight months after infection, raising concerns about the potential for sexual and mother-to-child transmission.

Nearly 60 percent of the survivors of an outbreak in Uganda from 2022-23 reported ongoing and debilitating health issues, even two years post-infection that interfered with their daily lives noted researchers at Washington State University.

"This is the first time anyone has been able to closely follow Sudan Ebola survivors over the long term, and the results show the virus continues to affect people's lives well after an outbreak ends," said lead researcher Kariuki Njenga, Professor in the WSU's College of Veterinary Medicine.

"Just as concerning is the fact we detected the virus in semen and breast milk, which shows there is a risk survivors could pass on Ebola months after recovery," Njenga added.

Ebola is a severe, often fatal hemorrhagic fever in humans caused by four known strains: Zaire, Sudan, Bundibugyo, and Taï Forest. The Zaire and Sudan are the deadliest strains, with case fatality rates ranging from 75-90 percent for Zaire and 55-65 percent for Sudan. IANS

West coast Sindhis genetically distinct from Pakistani Sindhis: Study

HYDERABAD: The Sindhi population on the west coast of India has a unique genetic makeup, which is different from Pakistani Sindhis, according to a study conducted by scientists at the CSIR-Centre for Cellular and Molecular Biology (CCMB), Hyderabad.

According to Dr. Kumarasamy Thangaraj, CSIR Bhatnagar Fellow at the CSIR-CCMB, who conducted the study along with his colleague, Dr. Lomous Kumar, Sindhis on the west coast of India show genetic affinities toward the Burusho or Hazara-like group from Pakistan, as well as recent genetic assimilation with local populations such as the Konkani.

Dr. Kumarasamy added that the existence of a unique East Asian genetic component in Sindhis of the west coast of India, compared to Pakistani Sindhis, can be attributed to minor admixtures occurring either directly through Mongolian migra-

tions or with contacts through Burusho and Hazara-like groups in present-day Pakistan, alternatively.

Burusho and Hazara are population groups with Mongoloid features found in present-day Pakistan.

"Our genetic study also found that the Indian Sindhi group has a small, unique genetic compotions, possibly Mongols, in their genomes," said Dr. Lomous Kumar, one of the authors of the study and a postdoctoral researcher at DST-Birbal Sahni Institute of Palaeosciences (BSIP),

"These findings conclusively demonstrate the demographic changes and population shifts in western India associated with multiple migrations. Some of these happened as early as the Iron or Middle Ages and some as recent as post-independence," said Dr. Vinay K. Nandicoori, Director, CSIR-CCMB.

The west coast of India is home to diverse human populations. This large region between the Arabian Sea and the Western Ghats has seen the movement of various West Eurasian groups, including the Portuguese, Middle Easterners, Jews, Parsees, and Christian mission-

Recent studies have focused on the genetic affinities of a few groups, such as Parsis, Jews, and Catholics.

However, the origins and genetic relationships of many southwest coast groups, often seen as remnants of later migrations, remain largely unexplored.

One such small community is the Indian Sindhis, who live on the west coast in Maharashtra. Due to the geographical proximity of the Sindh region in Pakistan, they have migrated to western India for centuries, but mass migration occurred during the partition of India, after indepen-

Although Pakistani Sindhis have been extensively studied, very limited genetic information is available about the Sindhis living on the west coast of India, who are socio-culturally quite distinct from the Konkan coast.

The first high-throughput genetic study on the Sindhi population living on the west coast of India has now been conducted by CCMB scientists. IANS

Long Covid patients more likely to suffer from unusual heart rhythm disorder

NEW DELHI: An unusual heart rhythm disorder, also known as Postural orthostatic tachycardia syndrome (POTS), is more common in people with long Covid, according to a study.


The study found that the condition, where the heart beats abnormally fast when changing position from lying down to standing up, is more common in middle-aged women than

For people affected with

POTS, standing up is a challenge. Their hearts beat faster than normal at rest and during exertion. Patients also experience fatigue and difficulties concentrating -- symptoms that are common in long Covid.

Researchers at Karolinska Institutet in Sweden found that POTS occurs in almost a third of patients with severe long Covid.

"Previous, smaller studies have shown that there is a connection, but now we can say with



certainty that POTS is a very common condition in patients with long Covid. This is valuable knowledge for both health care professionals and patients," said Mikael Björnson, doctoral student at the Department of Medicine, Solna, Karolinska Institutet.

The study, published in the journal Circulation: Arrhythmia and Electrophysiology, examined 467 patients with severe long Covid who had not been hospitalized for Covid-19. IANS

India's sex ratio at birth improved with 917 females per 1,000 males in 2021-23: Center

NEW DELHI: Strengthening the Pre-Conception and Pre-Natal Diagnostic Techniques (Prohibition of Sex Selection) Act has led to an improvement in the Sex Ratio at Birth (SRB), with 917 females per 1,000 males recorded in 2021-23, said Aradhana Patnaik, Additional Secretary & Mission Director (NHM), Ministry of Health and Family Welfare.

Speaking at a National Sensitisation Meeting on Strengthening the Pre-Conception and Pre-Natal Diagnostic Techniques (Prohibition of Sex Selection) Act, 1994, here she highlighted the progress made in the SRB over the last decade.

"The country has recorded a positive improvement in the Sex Ratio at Birth (SRB). As per the Sample Registration System (SRS) Report 2023, the SRB has increased by 18 points -- from 819 females per 1,000 males during 2016-18 to 917 females per 1,000 males in 2021-23.



The National Sex Ratio at Birth for the period 2021-23 thus stands at 917 females per 1,000 males, reflecting the progress made through strengthened implementation of the PC & PNDT Act and related interventions," Patnaik said.

Patnaik emphasized that the PC & PNDT Act is not just a legal instrument but a moral and social safeguard against gender-biased sex selection.

"Women by birth are more resilient and have a stronger immune system,

hence the survival of a female child is more possible naturally than a male child."

"Instead of taking action against gender-biased sex selection, we should focus on the prevention part of the PC & PNDT Act. The focus of the society or an Individual should be on having a healthy child rather than the gender of the child," she added.

The meeting focused on reinforcing the effective implementation of the PC & PNDT Act in view of emerging challenges, with an emphasis on coordinated efforts to address gaps, ensure compliance, and uphold the objectives of the legislation.

It also highlighted the pressing issue of online violations and misuse of new technologies, reinforcing the urgent need for proactive engagement with digital intermediaries and stronger compliance mechanisms to uphold the spirit of the Act. *IANS*

Over 4.4 lakh chikungunya disease cases, 155 deaths reported worldwide in 2025: WHO

NEW DELHI: The world saw more than 4.4 lakh suspected and confirmed cases of chikungunya disease and 155 deaths due to it from January to September 30, this year, said the World Health Organization (WHO).

In the latest outbreak notice from 40 countries, Chikungunya virus (CHIKV) disease was noted in several countries, including some that had not reported substantial case numbers in recent years.

"Between 1 January and 30 September 2025, a total of 4,45,271 suspected and confirmed CHIKV disease cases and 155 deaths were reported globally from 40 countries, including autochthonous and travel-imported cases," the WHO report said.

The region of the Americas with 3,28,920 suspected and confirmed CHIKV disease, reported the highest number of cases followed by the European

region (56,456 confirmed cases reported predominantly from French Overseas Departments in the Indian Ocean). The region also reported 40 deaths.

In India, between 1 January and 31 March 2025, a total of 30,876 suspected cases and 1,741 confirmed cases were reported. The states reporting the highest number of confirmed cases were Maharashtra, Karnataka, and Tamil

Nadu. No deaths were reported, as per the WHO report.

Another recent study, published in the British Medical Journal (BMJ) Global Health, showed that more than 1.40 crore people worldwide could be at risk of chikungunya infection every

The global modeling study, led by researchers at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, stated



that India could experience the biggest impacts of chikungunya, potentially putting 51 lakh people at risk of the mosquito-borne infection every year.

Brazil and Indonesia might be the second and third most affected, with impacts due to the disease in India and Brazil accounting for 48 percent of the global impact on healthcare systems and individuals, the findings showed. *IANS*

US, Japanese scientists awarded 2025 Nobel Prize for Medicine for discovery on immune system

NEW DELHI: A trio of Japanese and US scientists has been awarded the 2025 Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine for their discovery on how the immune system is kept in check.

The coveted prize by the Nobel Assembly at Karolinska Institutet was awarded to Mary E. Brunkow (US), Fred Ramsdell (US), and Shimon Sakaguchi (Japan). The prize money of 11 million Swedish kronor will be shared equally between the laureates.

"The 2025 #NobelPrize in Physiology or Medicine has been awarded to Mary E. Brunkow, Fred Ramsdell, and Shimon Sakaguchi for their discoveries concerning peripheral immune tolerance," the Nobel Assembly said in a statement.

The peripheral immune tolerance is a mechanism that prevents the immune system from harming the body.

The laureates identified the immune system's security guards, regulatory T cells -- which prevent immune cells from attacking our own body.

Their discoveries launched the field of peripheral tolerance, spurring the develop-

ment of medical treatments for cancer and autoimmune diseases. This may also lead to more successful transplantations. Several of these treatments are now undergoing clinical trials.



This childhood cancer survivor seeks to 'live every moment'

arshana Magan felt nauseous before leaping off the cliff. She was strapped into a tandem paraglider with an instructor, and her fear of heights sparked a roiling anxiety she has spent her entire life wrangling.

On this sunny day in San Diego, she stared, wide-eyed and bold, at the view before her of the Pacific Ocean, stretched in endless blue before her.

She told herself: "I survived cancer; I can do anything. I don't live my life in fear." And she leapt.

In the 30 years since Darshana survived her childhood cancer, the Midwestern accountant has snorkeled in the Atlantic off the coast of Trinidad, despite her fear of the ocean. She has skydived in Montauk, New York, and bungee jumped off bridges in New Zealand, some 130 feet high. She has faced her fears with courage and fortitude because it's how she learned to survive cancer when she was 10 years old.

Darshana grew up on the Gulf Coast of Mississippi,

with her parents, brothers and a crew of Indian-American kids whose parents worked long days in the motel industry. It was a dreamy, unencumbered childhood until a sudden fatigue kept her on the couch, listless. She was too tired to play, and her belly was swollen.

Her mother took her to the pediatrician thinking it was a simple stomach bug, but a check of her abdomen revealed a swollen spleen. Then, bloodwork showed Darshana had chronic myeloid leukemia, a form of cancer in the bone marrow more common in adults than children.

"My parents were crying, and I was crying because they were crying. That was the first time I'd ever seen my dad cry," Darshana said. "I had no idea what was going on, what leukemia was."

She was immediately referred to St. Jude Children's Research Hospital. St. Jude was founded in Memphis in 1962 by Danny Thomas, the son of immigrant parents, to treat children with cancer and other life-threatening diseases regardless of their race, ethnicity, beliefs or ability

to pay. Families never receive a bill from St. Jude for treatment, travel, housing or food, so they can focus on helping their child live, regardless of the duration or the cost of care.

By the time they got home from the hospital, all the families in the tightknit immigrant Indian community had gathered at her parents' motel to process the news together.

Darshana watched them approach with questions and worry, and found herself in the same position, confused and uncertain. What was leukemia like? Would she die?

When her friend Angel approached her, Darshana told her she had cancer, without fully understanding what it was, and that she was going to Memphis for treatment.

"Will you be back?" Angel asked.

"I don't know," Darshana told her.

Now, more than 30 years later, something about standing on that cliff in San Diego, or on the edge of a bridge harnessed only by her ankles, taps into the same kind of feeling she remembers in the early moments of her diagnosis. Fear and worry of the unknown. But the need to face it anyway.



It was 1993 when Darshana was at St. Jude, and the treatment for her type of leukemia didn't have a set protocol because it was so rare in children. She underwent two months of chemotherapy, and one week of highdose, full-body radiation treatment. She listened to cassette tapes of Kenny G and Aaron Neville to ease her anxiety. Doctors at St. Jude said she was a candidate for bone marrow transplant. Her younger brother, the

"Bone marrow transplant to me was like a rebirth,"

Darshana said. "Every year I acknowledge the day I got
my transplant more than I do my own birthday because
without that day I would not be here."

In the 30 years since Darshana survived her childhood cancer, the Midwestern accountant has snorkeled in the Atlantic off the coast of Trinidad, despite her fear of the ocean. She has skydived in Montauk, New York, and bungee jumped off bridges in New Zealand, some 130 feet high. She has faced her fears with courage and fortitude because it's how she learned to survive cancer when she was 10 years old

It took a few months for her immune system to adjust and strengthen after the transplant. She lost her sense of taste and had to re-learn how to enjoy the texture and flavor of food. By the time she returned to her hometown that fall, doctors told her she had no evidence of cancer.

"Cancer doesn't define me, but it has changed my life in a huge way," Darshana, now 42, said.

Surviving cancer has helped her be grateful for simple moments, she said.

"I stop to look for butterflies, rainbows. I'm a sucker for sunsets. These little things are happiness," Darshana said. "Surviving cancer taught me to stop, sit back, listen, observe what's around me, remind myself to live every moment like it's special because it is."

India, Brazil discuss roadmap to take bilateral trade to \$20 billion in 5 years

NEW DELHI: The seventh meeting of the India-Brazil Trade Monitoring Mechanism (TMM) was held here on 7 October, which underscores the commitment between India and Brazil to foster economic growth.

Rajesh Agrawal, Commerce Secretary, and Tatiana Lacerda Prazeres, Secretary of Foreign Trade at the Ministry of Development, Industry, Trade and Services for Brazil co-chaired the meeting.

During the meeting in the national capital, both sides extensively discussed matters related to bilateral trade and outlined a roadmap for taking it forward.

The discussions included the review of bilateral trade and investment relations, expansion of India-MERCOSUR PTA, market access issues, visa issues, sectorial collaborations in pharmaceuticals and healthcare, chemicals and petrochemicals, MSME, banking and finance, promotion of industries and internal trade, multilateral issues and other matters of mutual interest.

India and Brazil have been strong diplomatic partners for more than 75 years now.

The two countries have built a close and multifaceted relationship marked by shared democratic values and a commitment to development.

During the State visit of the Prime Minister Narendra Modi to Brazil in July 2025 and meeting with the Brazilian President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva, the leaders set a target to increase bilateral trade to \$20 billion over the next five years.

Brazil is the largest trading partner of India in the Latin American and Caribbean region. During the FY 2024-25, the bilateral merchandise trade stood at \$12.19 billion.

India's export story is clearly at a turning point. While the US will continue to be a vital partner, the extraordinary growth of exports to countries such as the Netherlands, UAE, Australia, Saudi Arabia, South Africa, Brazil, and Mexico demonstrates that India is no longer dependent on a single market. IANS

World Bank's BETI project empowering micro-level women in India to build businesses

NEW DELHI: The World Bank's project BETI (Business Enterprise Technology for Indian women) has trained micro-level women in the country in digital tools and financial management, enabling them to build

The pilot project, along with SEWA (Self-Employed Women's Association), one of the world's largest organizations of informal workers, trained women in Gujarat to use mobile apps and, manage their finances.

"Micro-level women entrepreneurs in #Gujarat are using mobile apps to manage thriving businesses. They are trained in financial management and market access through World Bank and SEWA support," the World Bank India shared in a recent post on social media platform X.



In a blog post, the World Bank shared how the project was an extension of the 'Beti Bachao, Beti Padhao' initiative, launched by Prime Minister Narendra Modi in 2015.

The BETI project added the dimension of 'Beti Kamao' to focus on empowering women economically. The project supports women's growth as entrepreneurs and job creators in the country.

"Empowering women entrepreneurs is an economic priority that will bring considerable benefits to India's economy," the blog post read.

It noted that providing a proper support system can be key to increasing the number, scale, and sustainability of women-led enterprises in the country.

"For this to be achieved, however, micro-level women entrepreneurs will need to better manage their businesses, find ways to reach wider markets, and obtain easier access to finance," the blog post said.

The pilot, operating in four districts of Gujarat --Mehsana, Ahmedabad, Anand, and Bodeli -- equipped the women with mobile-based tools to "improve their bookkeeping, better manage their inventory and debt, and systematically catalogue their products for sale".

The digital tools helped them with a better understanding of basic business concepts such as revenue, costs, and profits.

Although the project faces roadblocks such as limited access to smartphones by small women entrepreneurs and some being wary of new technology, but "many women said that the new digital tools have made it easy for them to track their income and expenditure, giving them a more accurate picture of their businesses," the blog post said. IANS

Nigerian national detained in Delhi for overstaying visa, deportation initiated

NEW DELHI: In a significant crackdown on illegal foreign nationals, the Operations Cell of the South West District Police has successfully traced and detained a Nigerian national found to be overstaying in India, Delhi Police said

The detained individual, identified as Apeh Nnanna Malachy, aged 39, is a resident of Enuguezike, Nigeria. He had been staying in India after his medical visa expired.

"Accordingly, a dedicated team comprising ASI Vinod

ceived a tip-off about a suspicious foreign national roaming in the Nangal Raya and Vasant Kunj South area.

Upon intercepting the individual and conducting a thorough verification, it was revealed that Malachy had entered India on March 15, 2021, on a medical visa, which expired on May 24, 2021, the police said.

He had been residing illegally in Delhi's Burari area and had recently moved to Mahipalpur in search of new accommodation due to increased police scrutiny.

Following his detention at PS Vasant Kunj South, all

legal and codal formalities were completed.

"After thorough verification and inquiry, the necessary legal formalities were completed, leading to initiation of his deportation through the Foreigners Regional Registration Office

(FRRO), New Delhi," the officials stated.

This operation is part of a broader initiative by the South West District Police to curb illegal immigration and enhance public safety.

"This successful operation highlights the South West District Police's zero-tolerance approach toward illegal immigration and our commitment to enforcing the rule of law," the police statement read. *IANS*

NEW DELHI: Noting that India's visa operations in Bangladesh are not at the level at which they were before the events of July and August last year in the neighboring country but it remains one of India's largest visa operations anywhere in the world, Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri stated there will "be an evolution of our stance" with

regard to this issue keeping in mind the people-centric relationship between the two countries.

He said visa service was affected by the overall security situation that prevailed in the wake of developments of in August last year in Bangladesh.

"Yes, it is not at the level at which it was before the events of July and August last year but even today with the numbers that are there it remains one of our largest visa operations anywhere in the world. I think you are no strangers to the fact that there were certain developments that took place on the ground

in the midst of the events of July and August of 2024," Misri told a group of visiting Bangladesh journalists.

"I am not sure that much purpose is served by going into the details of those events as to who was responsible, what happened, what did not happen. As I said my perspective is to look forward, not to look behind to ascribe blame or to look for culprits, what should have been

done, what our expectations were etc. But it is a fact that the provision of a service such as visas in that environment was affected by the overall security situation that prevailed at that point in time. As a result of that we had to readjust our footprint, the number of people that we could have to provide these services," he added.

Awami League leader Sheikh Hasina resigned as Bangladesh Prime Minister and fled to India in August last year in the wake of student led agitation that witnessed violence. There were several incidents of violence reported later.

Misri said India has responded as situation improved on the ground in Bangladesh.

"Since you have been watching this situation closely, I hope that you have noted that as things have seemed to improve on the ground we have also responded and the numbers are already well beyond where they were in the im-

mediate aftermath when the rather disturbing security incidents including some that were targeted at our visa operations took place," he said.

"I can assure you that as we move forward there will be an evolution of our stance with regard to this issue, keeping in mind exactly as you have said the people-centric relationship that we have," he added. *ANI*

California to sue over Trump sending National Guard to Portland

LOS ANGELES: California Governor Gavin Newsom announced that the US State of California would sue the Trump administration for deploying National Guard from the state into Portland, Oregon, saying Trump "is using the US military as a political weapon against American citizens."

In a press release, Newsom disclosed that US President Donald Trump is deploying 300 California National Guard troops to Portland after a federal judge temporarily denied Trump the ability to federalize the Oregon National Guard, Xinhua news agency reported.

"They are on their way there now," the press release said. "This is a breathtaking abuse of the law and power. The Trump Administration is unapologetically attacking the rule of law itself and putting into action their dangerous words -- ignoring

court orders and treating judges, even those appointed by the President himself, as political opponents."

"We will take this fight to court, but the public cannot stay silent in the face of such reckless and authoritarian conduct by the President of the United States," Newsom said.

"The Trump Administration is unapologetically attacking the rule of law itself and putting into action their dangerous words -- ignoring court orders and treating judges, even those appointed by the President himself, as political opponents"

Trump claimed that the deployment of federalized troops was necessary because the city of Portland was under siege by protesters opposing the immigration enforcement actions conducted by federal agents.

On September 27, Trump ordered to send "all necessary troops" to Portland, putting 200 members of the Oregon National Guard under the command of Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth.

Oregon State and the city of Portland filed a lawsuit in response to this order on September 28. Karin Immergut, a federal judge in Oregon, wrote in her ruling Saturday (4 Oct.) that the protests there were "not significantly violent or disruptive" to justify Trump's use of Oregon's National Guard.

The Trump administration later appealed that decision to the 9th US Circuit Court of Appeals based in San Francisco, California. This court previously restored Trump's ability to call up the National Guard in Los Angeles in June, after a federal judge in San Francisco ruled it should be halted. *IANS*

'Around 35 pc of 650 operational malls in India now meet institutional grade'

NEW DELHI: The Indian retail real estate sector is increasingly driven by institutional players and of the 650 operational malls across the country, 30-35 percent now meet institutional grade, a recent report said.

The sector's rapid evolution from fragmented, quantity-driven growth to quality, institutional consolidation is a transformation saga with few global parallels.

"Grade A malls have risen from just 22 percent of the inventory in the top seven cities in 2015 to a projected 60 percent by 2027. Meanwhile, vacancies have reduced from 19 percent to about 9 percent - a dramatic sign of improving quality and demand," according to latest report by Anarock research.

According to the report, this trend is most visible among top players which collectively own 58 malls spanning 34 million square feet and have over 45 new malls spanning over 42.5 million sq ft of prime retail space in the pipeline for the next 3-5 years.

"It is notable how quickly institutional investment is spreading beyond the metros into Tier 2 hubs. Chandigarh, Indore, Surat, Bhubaneshwar, and Coimbatore, with highly aspirational populations and increasing purchase power, are the new growth centers for organized retail," said Anuj Kejriwal, CEO and MD, Anarock Retail. The Indian retail industry is driven by changing consumer expectations, global brands' preference for standardized and experiential spaces, he added. IANS

ED seizes Rs 10.55 crore assets of Ansal Properties in money laundering case linked to pollution law violations

NEW DELHI: The Enforcement Directorate (ED) has provisionally attached assets worth Rs 10.55 crore belonging to Ansal Properties and Infrastructure Ltd (APIL) and its promoters in a money laundering case related to violations of environmental laws, the agency said

The attached assets include six immovable properties - commercial units and spaces located in Gurugram (Haryana), Greater Noida (Uttar Pradesh) and Ludhiana (Punjab).

These properties are held by APIL's directors, shareholders and beneficial owners, namely Sushil Ansal, Pranav Ansal and Son HUF, and Kusum Ansal.

The enforcement action was taken under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA), 2002.

The case stems from prosecution complaints filed by the Haryana State Pollution Control Board (HSPCB), citing noncompliance with provisions of

the Water (Prevention and Control of Pollution) Act, 1974, and the Air (Prevention and Control of Pollution) Act, 1981.

According to the ED, it "initiated investigation on the basis of Prosecution Complaints filed by Haryana State Pollution Control Board (HSPCB) for commission of scheduled offences

We chose to move into a gated complex because of the security, cleanliness and availability of all amenities in the same complex. In our new house, which is a 3BHK, we pay Rs 18,000 per month as maintenance - which is almost six times the previous one. However, the convenience is unmatched. We have play park, swimming class, badminton class, tennis, gym, tuitions, art class etc. in the same complex which is very helpful as the children can be independent. there is no outside commute involved and we get lot of time in hand." www.housing.com

India's office leasing grows 24 pc in 2025 till date: Report

NEW DELHI: India's office market surpassed 1 billion square feet in the third quarter of 2025, and the year-todate (YTD) volumes grew 24 percent YoY, positioning the market for an annual record, as per recent report.

Despite the market being on track for a fresh annual high, the report from real estate services firm Knight Frank noted that the leasing during the quarter primarily came from Grade Aleasing, which repre-

sented 88 percent of quarterly volumes and 92 percent year-to-date, the report noted.

Bengaluru, Mumbai, and the National Capital Region accounted for half of the volumes transacted, and Bengaluru led with 4.2 million square ft in Q3 2025.

Hyderabad and Chennai contributed significantly to the volume growth during the quarter, achieving a year-over-year increase of 33 percent and 9 percent, respectively.

Global Capability Centres (GCCs) accounted for approximately 5.7 million sq ft of office space transactions, making up the largest share at 32 percent among all occupier segments. Bengaluru was the top choice for this segment, accounting for a massive 65 percent of the GCC-related leasing activity in Q3 2025, the report noted.

Further, rental levels in the larger office markets of Mumbai, NCR and Bengaluru grew by 11 percent, 9 percent and 6 percent YoY, respectively. With global Al adoption accelerating, India's deep talent pool and cost advantages continue to strengthen its appeal as a hub for outsourced IT services, the report noted.

The Quarters to Sell (QTS) indicator has remained below 18 months in the eight key markets throughout the past year. QTS indicates the time needed to absorb current inventory based on the average sales pace of the past eight quarters. *IANS*



New Delhi's Taliban Tilt: Afghan Women Bitter Over Muttaqi Visit To India

ndia does not formally recognize the Taliban regime in Afghanistan. Yet, for the first time, a senior Taliban member, Foreign Minister Amir Khan Muttaqi, will soon visit India as a guest of the Indian government. India even sought a special waiver for his visit from the United Nations.

Most members of the Taliban were sanctioned as terrorists by the UN Security Council. Under Security Council resolution 1988, most Taliban-linked individuals face a travel ban, asset freeze and arms embargo for whom exceptions can be granted, by consensus, by all 15 UNSC members. Pakistan, a non-permanent UNSC member, currently chairs the UN's 1988 Sanctions Committee.

While there would be several strategic reasons for India to invite Muttaqi to India, New Delhi's decision is being seen by women of Afghanistan as a betrayal. Under the Taliban's misogynist edicts, women have been deprived of most human rights, including the right to educa-

tional award for her efforts to uphold human and women's rights and keep the world informed about what was happening to her and women like her within Afghanistan. After the woman, who is part of a network of women who brought out the ZAN Times, an online newspaper seeking to highlight the problems women face just to survive under the harsh Taliban regime, was notified about the award, she looked forward to a brief reprieve from the harsh conditions of her life outside Kabul. Not only did the journalist, nurtured in the post-Taliban 1.0 era after 2001, not get a visa to come to India to receive the award, despite requests from the organization giving the awards, she found herself endangered under her government's critical

That India could turn down such legitimate visa requests seemed unfair and unkind to her.



Women Find India Wanting

When Russia formally recognized the Taliban regime earlier this year, Afghan women were not so embittered as they have been by India's overtures to the fundamentalist regime. Some Afghan women who managed to flee from Kabul when the Taliban 2.0 came rampaging back to power in August 2021, were scathing in their criticism.

One woman, who lives abroad but cannot be identified for security reasons, said she was refused a visa to travel to India though her life was threatened by the Taliban. Yet the Indian government is rolling out the red carpet for a member of the regime threatening her very existence.

Another woman, who must also remain unidentified, received an interna-

Change In Indian Policy

India made no outreach to the Taliban during their first tenure between 1996 and 2001. It actively opposed that re-

gime, providing tacit support to the Northern Alliance led by Ahmed Shah Masood.

Analysts said the international community's constant scrutiny helped oust that harsh misogynist regime and helped women survive that stint of Taliban rule. This time, however, international interlocutors feel there is no credible opposition to the Taliban, which, after four years in power, is in full control, and there is no alternative power center they could threaten to support. Collective efforts have yielded no flexibility or removal of draconian restrictions on women.

Before Taliban 2.0 took power, women's economic empowerment was a national development priority, integral to Afghan growth and sustainability.

The Third Eye: Trump's initiative in Gaza

S President Donald Trump seeking to be 'the peacemaker of the world', embarked on a detailed plan of resolving the conflict in Gaza in the back drop of Hamas feeling the weight of Israel's full-blown offensive backed by the US on one hand and some important European countries including France and Britain besides Canada and Australia, supporting recognition of a Palestinian state, on the other.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi, in keeping with India's policy of favoring peaceful resolutions of all armed conflicts of global implications, has lost no time in welcoming Trump's 20-point plan for ending the Gaza conflict, saying that it provided a 'visible pathway' for long-term peace for the Palestinian and Israeli people.

While Hamas has responded by agreeing to review Donald Trump's plan, Israeli Prime Minby Hamas 'within 72 hours', disarmament of Hamas, grant of amnesty to Hamas elements who accepted the idea of 'peaceful coexistence' with Israel and gradual Israeli withdrawal from Gaza followed by a post-war transitional authority headed by Trump himself - thus putting the US President right at the center of implementation of a possible peace accord. It is reported that Qatar-which had hosted the Doha talks between US and Taliban for the withdrawal of American troops from Afghanistan in Biden Presidency and which has now provided a safe shelter for Hamas's exiled leadership- has indicated that Hamas would study the proposal seriously and responsibly.

Hamas is said to have already begun consultations with its political and military leaders both inside Palestine and abroad. The targeted missile attack

ister Benjamin Netanyahu warned that if Hamas rejected it, then 'Israel will finish the job by itself'. He claimed that he had not agreed to a Palestinian state during his talks in Washington. Netanyahu, however, told the US President that Israel supported the latter's plan to end the war in Gaza, which 'achieves our war aims'. President Trump announced in his typically hyperbolic style that 'we have one signature that we need and that signature will pay in hell if they don't sign'. Significantly, Saudi Arabia-a US ally- had been working with the UK and France to promote the idea of a twostate solution for the Palestine dispute.

Trump's plan calls for a ceasefire, release of hostages

made by Israel on September 8 on the residential compound housing the Hamas leadership at Doha, top leaders of the outfit barely surviving the attacksurely made an impact on the latter. At the same time, killing of more than sixty thousand Palestinians-mostly civilians- had created a humanitarian crisis in Gaza, attracting the attention of the world that could not be disregarded by the US. Amidst Israeli air strikes and shelling continuing across Gaza, the Palestinian Authority welcomed Trump's 'sincere and determined efforts'. With key Arab and Muslim countries supporting the peace initiative of Donald Trump, Hamas seemed to be under greater pressure, particularly because its organized terror attack on Israel on October 7 in 2023 is what had triggered the retaliatory Israel Defense Forces (IDF) attack in Gaza.

Interestingly, President Donald Trump stated once again that he settled the 'very big' conflict between nucleararmed India and Pakistan. He was addressing Generals and Admirals summoned from around the world by Pentagon chief Pete Hegseth in Quantico, the Marine Base town in Virginia. The address was designed to counter the reservations expressed in US Army circles against the deployment of Defense force for ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement) work. Claiming that he had settled 'so many wars' since his becoming President of the US in January, Trump remarked that it would be an 'insult' to the US if he does not receive the Nobel Peace Prize, adding sarcastically that 'they might give it to some guy who didn't do a damn

It is significant that President Trump specifically named Pakistan President Shahbaz Sharif and Field Marshall Asif Munir, Pak Army Chief among the world leaders who fully supported his plan to end the Gaza conflict. Sharif who was in New York for the high level 80th session of the UN General Assembly had met Trump, along with Munir in the White House. The Pak leaders had already gone on record to recommend President Donald Trump for the Nobel Peace Prize for bringing about a ceasefire between India and Pakistan after the two countries had got into a military confrontation following the Pak-directed terror attack at Pahalgam.

The US President already had the backing of Israel on the Nobel Prize question. Trump took his claim for Nobel Peace Prize to the UN forum on September 25. (The writer is a former Director Intelligence Bureau) IANS

ONCE BITTEN NOT TWICE SHY

The finding of Osama Bin Laden hiding in Pakistan exposed Pakistan's duplicity and its succeeding in milking millions of US taxpayers' dollars, which CIA and FBI both failed to detect. U.S. revealed significant security failures fostering a perception that Pakistan cannot be a fully trusted ally. The 'Operation Abbottabad' found Bin Laden in Abbottabad, Pakistan, revealing that the world's most wanted terrorist had been living in a compound for years without Pakistan's intelligence services (ISI) knowing of his whereabouts.

A Pakistani government investigation, leaked to Al Jazeera, concluded that Bin Laden's presence was not due to a stand-alone failure but indicative of "culpable negligence and incompetence" at various levels of government. The reality of Bin Laden hiding near major military facilities led to accusations, both within and outside Pakistan, of potential complicity or, at least a profound failure to control its territory. The incident was a significant blow to U.S.-Pakistan relations and led to decreased trust in Pakistan's security establishment's commitment to combating extremism. The event continues to fuel discussions and skepticism about the extent to which Pakistan can be relied upon to act decisively against terrorist networks operating within its borders.

In a recent meeting at the White House between US President Donald Trump, Pakistani Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif, and Army Chief Asim Munir, has been hailed in Islamabad as long-awaited rehabilitation. For Pakistan's generals, it was rehabilitation after years of marginalization. Yet the embrace reflects America's short-term needs, not a long game plan. Washington is once again "putting lipstick on Rawalpindi's generals". Ayesha Siddiqa, Pakistan's foremost critic of praetorianism warns such gestures empower authoritarianism at home. Munir is now poised for an extension, his authority burnished.

The Saudi-Pakistan pact provides Riyadh manpower and reassures Washington. Pakistan's military, with its deep ties to Saudi Arabia, is being drawn into this equation. Islamabad has also rebranded itself as a 'resource state'. The Sharif-Munir delegation showcased mineral samples in Washington, touting a \$500-million memorandum with a US firm in rare earths. The Financial Times called it a blend of "flattery, minerals, and crypto". But Pakistan's extractive sector is plagued by opacity and elite capture. Without strong governance and transparency, foreign investment could enrich a narrow circle while doing little to stabilize the economy.

No rapprochement with Washington can be understood in isolation from Pakistan's dependence on China. For over a decade, Beijing has been Pakistan's largest financier, arms supplier and diplomatic patron, underwriting the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC). Yet the shine of CPEC has faded. Projects have slowed, debts have mounted, and militant attacks on Chinese engineers have exposed Pakistan's fragility. Beijing has grown cautious, delaying projects and pressing for security.

History warns that US-Pakistan's embraces empower generals and weakens democracies. Tactical gains in Gaza or Afghanistan may come at the cost of entrenching military authoritarianism in Islamabad. For Washington, the challenge is to avoid mistaking short-term utility for long-term strategy. For India, the challenge is simpler: do not be distracted by the puppet show. Pakistan remains a fragile state, strategically located but perpetually unstable. It seems US has not learnt any lessons from earlier and, is not twice shy.


