

He projected that India is on track to become the world's third-largest economy by 2027, citing strong banking systems,



low inflation, controlled fiscal deficits, growing consumer sentiment and infrastructure expansion supported by GST reforms as key contributors to India's robust economic fundamentals.

Referring to Prime Minister Narendra Modi's vision, the minister recalled the statement that India is not merely an emerging market but an emerging model of development.

'Will boost trade, cultural ties': EAM Jaishankar launches two Indian Consulates in Russia

MOSCOW: External Affairs Minister (EAM) S. Jaishankar has emphasized that opening of the two new Indian Consulates General in Russia would deepen bilateral engagement and marks a new phase in the relationship between the two countries.

Speaking at the inauguration of Consulates General of India in Yekaterinburg and Kazan in Russia, EAM said, "This is an important day for us, when we are adding two more consulates, consulate generals in this country. And I want to say that over the last few months, consistent work has been underway to establish these consulates, as you heard from the Ambassador at the earliest possible time."

The event was attended by Russian Deputy Foreign Minister Andrey Rudenko, Indian Ambassador to Russia Vinay Kumar, representatives from the governor's office in Kazan and Yekaterinburg, officials of the Russian government, and several members of the Indian community.

Acknowledging the support extended by the Russian government, EAM Jaishankar expressed gratitude to Deputy Foreign Minister Rudenko as well as to the regional governments of the Republic of Tatarstan and the Sverdlovsk Oblast region.

Highlighting the significance of Yekaterinburg, EAM noted that the region is often called the third capital of Russia due to its industrial importance. He further

stressed that the region--a gateway to Siberia-- is also a hub for heavy engineering, gem cutting, defense manufacturing, metallurgy, nuclear fuel, chemicals and medical equipment.

"The region hosts one of the most prominent international economic forums in Russia, the INNOPROM. The opening of the consulate will give impetus to enable and to strengthen the technological, scientific, economic and trade collaboration between Indian and Russian industries," the EAM emphasized.

"Kazan is one of the most visited cities in Russia. I have had the pleasure of going there myself, after Moscow and St. Petersburg, and with good reason, the region is a multicultural and multi-ethnic hub and acts as a bridge between Russia and the rest of Asia. The consulate will help strengthen people-to-people ties by encouraging cross-cultural exchanges and ITEC participation. Kazan is well known for its oil production and refining for fertilizers, automobiles, defense, manufacturing, pharmaceuticals and electrical equipment," he added.

EAM Jaishankar expressed hope that the Indian diaspora, the business community and especially young students would benefit from the consular services and diplomatic presence of India in the two regions.

"I'm very sure that the opening of these consulates will not only enhance our diplomatic presence in Russia, but will act as a catalyst to further boost trade, to increase tourism, economic, scientific, technology, and even academic and cultural ties between our two countries," EAM stated. *IANS*

Focus on 'effectively utilizing' Chabahar port as Afghan minister begins India visit

NEW DELHI/KABUL: Afghan Industry and Commerce Minister Alhaj Nooruddin Azizi arrived in New Delhi, kicking off the official visit of a high-ranking government delegation from Kabul with the aim of activating and effectively utilizing the capacities of India-developed Chabahar Port in Iran and attracting and drawing more investments.

Welcoming the visiting minister, the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) stated that advancing bilateral trade and investment ties is the key focus of Azizi's visit.

Just ahead of the visiting delegation's arrival in India, Afghanistan's Ministry of Industry and Commerce stated that enhancing bilateral trade through the port will be a key agenda of discussions during Azizi's visit.

"During this trip, the Afghan delegation, while visiting the Pragati Maidan International Exhibition, will meet with high-ranking officials of the Government of India, including the Ministers of Foreign Affairs and

Commerce besides traders, investors, and honorable members of the private sector of the two countries. The focus of

these meetings is to expand economic cooperation, facilitate trade relations, create joint investment opportunities, and strengthen Afghanistan's role in the region's transit routes," read a statement issued by the Afghan ministry.

"This trip is evaluated as an important step towards strengthening economic and commercial relations between the two countries, and it is expected that its results will play a significant role in improving communications, boosting trade, and developing transit routes," it added while stressing the need to effectively utilizing the capacities of Chabahar Port in Iran.

Kabul is keen on facilitating transit of goods through India-developed Chabahar port in Iran, especially after increasing border tensions with neighboring Pakistan that has resulted in massive losses for traders on both sides of the Durand Line.

Earlier this month, the Afghan media reported that amidst the rising Afghanistan-Pakistan tensions, the ruling Taliban regime wants to explore Chabahar port's vast potential and sees it as a new "opportunity". *IANS*

India has right to defend its people against terrorism will exercise it: EAM Jaishankar in Moscow

MOSCOW: External Affairs Minister (EAM) S Jaishankar, while addressing the Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO) Council of Heads of Government meeting in Moscow, once again called for zero tolerance towards terrorism and stressed that there can be "no whitewashing, justification towards terrorism".

"We must never forget that the SCO was founded to combat the three evils of terrorism, separatism, and extremism.

The Council of Heads of Government (CHG) is the second-most important SCO mechanism which meets annually to decide upon major issues of trade-economic cooperation as well as the SCO annual budget. The last meeting of CHG was held in Pakistan in October 2024.

India, EAM Jaishankar said, also strongly believes that people-to-people exchanges lie at the core of any genuine relationship.

It is imperative that the world display zero tolerance towards terrorism in all its forms and manifestations. There can be no justification, no looking away and no whitewashing

These threats have become even more serious in the years that have passed. It is imperative that the world display zero tolerance towards terrorism in all its forms and manifestations. There can be no justification, no looking away and no whitewashing. As India has demonstrated, we have the right to defend our people against terrorism and will exercise it," EAM Jaishankar said in his remarks at the meeting.

"As a civilizational state, India strongly believes that people-to-people exchanges lie at the core of any genuine relationship. Facilitating greater interaction between our intellectuals, artists, sports people, and cultural icons will pave the way for deeper understanding across the SCO. We also have a growing record of collaborative activities with regard to cultural exchanges. The exposition of sacred Buddhist relics in many of your countries is a notable ex-

ample. India is also willing to extend its considerable experience of heritage conservation in Southeast Asia to Central Asia regarding humanitarian cooperation," he

EAM Jaishankar expressed India's strong support for reform-oriented agenda and added that India welcomes centers addressing challenges like organized crime, drug trafficking and cyber security. He further said, "As the organization becomes more diverse, the SCO must be more flexible and more adaptable. To this end, the long delayed decision to make English an official language of the SCO must be prioritized."

Elaborating on India's approach to the trade and economic issues, he mentioned, "We assess the global economic situation to be particularly uncertain and volatile currently. Supply side risks have been aggravated by demand side complexities. There is consequently an urgent requirement to derisk and diversify. This is best done by as many of us forging the widest possible economic links. For that to happen, it is essential that this process be fair, transparent and equitable. India's endeavors to conclude free trade arrangements with many of you here are relevant." IANS

India to showcase expanding defense, aerospace strength at **Dubai Air Show 2025**

DUBAI: India is set to showcase an extensive spectrum of its defense and aerospace capabilities at the Dubai Air Show 2025 from November 17-18.

Union Minister of State for Defense Sanjay Seth is leading the Indian delegation at the recent event in the United Arab Emirates (UAE).

The Indian contingent will comprise senior representatives from the Defense Ministry, the Department of Defense Production, the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) and the Armed Forces.

During the exhibition, Minister Seth will hold a bilateral meeting with his UAE counterpart to discuss avenues for enhanced defense cooperation.

He will also preside over an industry roundtable featuring around 50 companies from India, the UAE, Australia, the US, Brazil, the UK, and Italy, where discussions will focus on advancing defense technology collaboration and expanding manufacturing prospects in India. IANS

India ridicules mired UNSC reform as 'theatre of the absurd'

UNITED NATIONS: Ridiculing the nearly two decade-long futile negotiations to reform the Security Council as "theatre of the absurd", India has called for a constructive approach that adopts a text to move the mired process forward.

"In the 17 years since the IGN format was initiated, it has been reduced to a theater of the absurd", India's Deputy Permanent Representative Yojna Patel said on Tuesday, referring to the Intergovernmental Negotiations on reforming the Council.

"Member states are trapped in an endless cycle of statements and discussions that lead nowhere", she said at a General Assembly meeting on Council reform.

To bring credibility to the reform process, "India reiterates its call for the early start of text-based negotiations with transparent milestones and timelines", Patel said.

She called for "introspection and soul searching" to see why the reform has failed to make progress.

"Are we willing to honestly work for

achieving tangible progress, or are we condemned, like Sisyphus, to be trapped in this endless cycle till eternity?" she

Patel said that India hopes the newly appointed IGN co-chairs would be able to move the discussions to concrete outcomes during the current session.

Assembly President Annalena Baerbock has appointed Permanent Representatives Tareg M. A. M. AlBanai of Kuwait and Lise Gregoire-van Haaren of the Netherlands as the co-chairs of

Progress at the IGN is blocked by a small group of countries that call themselves United for Consensus (UfC), which uses procedural maneuvers to block the adoption of a negotiating text that would outline the parameters of discussion and track progress, condemning the process to a Sisyphean fate, as Patel said.

The primary objective of the group led by Italy and comprising Pakistan is to prevent the addition of new permanent members to the Council. IANS

'China behind disinformation campaign after **Operation Sindoor'**

WASHINGTON: The US-China Economic and Security Review Commission, a US Congress-created advisory body, accused China of masterminding a disinformation campaign after Operation Sindoor, as part of its Gray Zone activities to use "fake social media accounts to propagate AI images of supposed 'debris' from planes."

"China initiated a disinformation campaign to hinder sales of French Rafale aircraft in favor of its own J-35s, using fake social media accounts to propagate AI images of supposed 'debris' from the planes that China's weaponry destroyed," it said in its annual report to Congress.

The report also claimed that Beijing "opportunistically" leveraged the India-Pakistan conflict in May to "advertise the sophistication of its weapons, useful in the contexts of its ongoing border tensions with India and its expanding defense industry

India launched Operation Sindoor to retaliate against the Pahalgam attack in April that killed 26 civilians, striking terror installations and military targets inside Pakistan.

In August, Indian Air Force Chief AP Singh revealed that Indian forces had destroyed five Pakistani fighter jets and one, large airborne surveillance aircraft during Operation

On India-China ties, the Commission states there is an "asymmetry" between the two sides regarding the resolution of the border issue.

"China leverages high-level, wellpublicized dialogues to reach partial resolutions-hoping to open the door for bilateral cooperation on trade and other areas by compartmentalizing the border issue without sacrificing its core interests," while "India wants a sustainable solution to the border issues"

"In recent years, the Indian government has increasingly recognized the seriousness of the threat posed by China at the border," it emphasized.

According to the report, the current terms of bilateral economic cooperation or border resolution agreements were "largely conceptual," with few "specifics or follow-ups" announced by either side. IANS

hite supremacist ideas once confined to the margins of U.S. society have increasingly entered mainstream political and cultural spaces, shaping debates, influencing policy, and fueling polarization. ACoM briefing on Nov 14 explored how white supremacist narratives and ideologies have become normalized in public discourse, their connections to Christian nationalism and political mobilization, and what this shift means for communities and journalists covering these issues.

Heath Druzin, Journalist and Host of the Extremely American podcast, covering mainstreaming of extremist and militia movements, as well as Christian Nationalism stated that social media has accelerated the spread of extremist ideologies, making previously unthinkable statements normalized online.

hite supremacist ideas once confined to the margins of U.S. society have increasingly entered mainstream political and cultural spaces, shaping debates, influencing policy, and fueling polarization. ACoM briefing on Nov 14 explored how white supremacist narratives and ideologies have become normalized in public discourse, their connections to Christian nationalism and political mobilization, and what this shift means for communities and journalists covering these issues.

Heath Druzin, Journalist and Host of the Extremely American podcast, covering the mainstreaming of extremist and militia movements, as well as Christian Nationalism stated that social media has accelerated the spread of extremist ideologies, making previously unthinkable statements normalized online. Furthermore, the public use of derogatory racial language by political leaders has given extremist rhetoric social legitimacy. He cautioned that conspiracy theories repeatedly appearing in mainstream politics today often originate from white supremacist organizations, and the media must identify their vocabu-

lary and expose their true nature.

Matthew D. Taylor, Ph.D., Senior Christian Scholar, Institute for Islamic, Christian, and Jewish Studies (ICJS) pointed out that this ideology is not mainstream Christianity, but rather a political ideology that takes for granted the United States as a Christian nation and regards white Protestant culture as the orthodox ideology of the country. He said that since 2015, Trump has successfully attracted a large number of non-denominational Pentecostal

cult to detect because they are packaged in religious language.

Sanford F. Schram, Adjunct Lecturer in Political Science, Stony Brook University (SUNY) and co-author of Hard White: The Mainstreaming of Racism in American Politics stated that white supremacist sentiment did not begin in the President Trump era, but rather accelerated after Obama's election. He pointed out that xenophobic rhetoric existed within the Republican Party as early as the Reagan era,

Against this backdrop, some Christian supremacists even advocate that women should not vote and that the government should legislate entirely based on the Bible. Such exclusive ideas are more diffi-

gradually growing stronger through the Tea Party and the Trump movement, making "white identity politics" a significant force within the Republican Party today. He emphasized that an increasing number of white people see themselves as new victims, viewing multiculturalism as a threat; this sentiment drives votes and gives extreme policies social legitimacy.

Devin Burghart, Executive Director of the Institute for Research & Education on Human Rights (IREHR) states that across the United States, the far-right movement had only about 25,000 core members in the 1970s, but today its related online communities have millions. He states that the reason why extremist groups' ideologies can infiltrate the mainstream from the periphery is because a large number of state legislators have joined far-right organizations, allowing fringe conspiracy theories to directly become part of legislation. He warns that the far-right movement not only intensifies racial hatred but also promotes policies such as anti-vaccine, anti-LGBTQ, weakening women's rights, and eradicating Black history education, posing a structural danger to the democratic system.

When discussing how to rebuild trust and safeguard democracy, scholars generally believe that the United States is at a critical juncture. Taylor stated that many countries around the world have experienced democratic regression due to the combination of religion or nationalism with populist movements; the only effective way is to build a coalition that represents the greatest common denominator across ethnic groups and the political spectrum.

EAM Jaishankar meets Indian envoys in New York to review India-US ties

WASHINGTON: External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar chaired a conference of Indian Consul Generals in the United States, convening senior Indian diplomats from missions across the country to review India-US bilateral cooperation and engagement with the Indian diaspora.

The meeting, held in New York last week, brought together senior diplomats from the Indian Embassy in Washington, D.C., and consulates in New York, San Francisco, Chicago, Atlanta, Houston,

Boston, Los Angeles and Seattle.

In a post on X, Jaishankar wrote, "Chaired a Consul Generals Conference in New York today...Reviewed our bilateral ties and support for diaspora activities. Appreciate the commitment and efforts of our Embassy & Donsulates to strengthening the India-US partnership."

The meeting was also attended by Indian Ambassador to the United States Vinay Kwatra.

Jaishankar also met with UN Secretary-

General Antonio Guterres for a wide-ranging discussion of the current global situation and multilateralism.

After their meeting at UN headquarters

"Also appreciated his perspectives on various regional hotspots", he added.

Jaishankar came to New York for a quick visit after wrapping up his Canada trip, during which he participated in the G7 foreign ministers' meeting and met with several foreign ministers, including

Indo-Pacific."

Jaishankar's meeting with Rubio came days after US President Donald Trump said that the US is very close to signing a trade agreement with India.

"We are making a deal with India, much different deal than we had in the past...We're getting a fair deal, just a fair trade deal. We're getting close...I think we're pretty close to doing a deal that's good for everybody," Trump stated. *IANS*

use; besides lines from Upanishads and Bhagavad-Gita (Song of the Lord), both ancient Hindu scriptures. He plans to start and end prayer with "Om", the mystical syllable containing the universe, which in Hinduism is used to introduce and conclude religious work.

Brahadaranyakopanishad, Rajan Zed plans to say "Asato ma sad gamaya, Tamaso ma jyotir gamaya, Mrtyor mamrtam gamaya"; which he will then interpret as "Lead us from the unreal to the real, Lead us from darkness to light, and Lead us from death to immortality." India's GDP to grow 7.2 pc in FY26, driven by rate cuts, public capex

NEW DELHI: India's economy is expected to grow 7.2 percent in fiscal 2026, driven by rate cuts, regulatory measures, strong monsoon, government capex and surplus liquidity, a recent report said.

Some impacts from GDP deflators are expected to fade in FY27, taking real GDP growth to 6.5 percent and nominal growth pace back towards 10 percent, the report from Development Bank of Singapore (DBS) said.

The report said that the room for aggressive RBI rate cuts is limited amid firm growth and inflation undershoot. However, it added that a clear case for reductions could emerge in Q4CY25 if forward risks to growth appear, with prevailing low inflation providing them with the necessary room.

"We expect support from home-grown levers, such as rate cuts, transmission of past reductions, regulatory measures, support for tariff-hit sectors, strong monsoon, low inflation, government capex spending, and surplus liquidity to offset the negative impact from global uncertainties," it said.

The central bank's support is necessary for foreign exchange and bond markets, via open market operations and through ongoing secondary market purchases, it noted. *IANS*


Satya Nadella to visit India from Dec 10-12; to meet top leaders, discuss Al push

The India-born tech leader will travel to Delhi, Bengaluru, and Mumbai as part of his tour, during which he is expected to meet Prime Minister Narendra Modi, IT Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw, and other senior government officials. *IANS*



Delhi's Khan Market remains India's most expensive retail location, ranks 24th globally



NEW DELHI: Khan Market in New Delhi ranks 24th globally, maintaining its position as India's most expensive retail location with rents at \$223 per square foot (psf) per year -- up 3 percent year-on-year, according to a report on Wednesday.

While its global ranking slipped slightly from 23rd to 24th, Khan Market remains India's most expensive high street, reflecting resilience and enduring appeal amid a competitive global landscape, said Cushman & Wakefield's 35th edition of its retail report, 'Main Streets Across the World.'

Notably, India's retail sector has outperformed both the global and APAC averages, registering a 6 percent rental growth (on-year).

London's New Bond Street has been crowned the world's most expensive retail destination for the first time, where rents have risen by 22 percent in the past year to \$2,231 per square foot per year.

New Bond Street has leap-frogged Milan's Via Montenapoleone (\$2,179 psf/year), which last year became the first European street to top the global rankings, and New York's iconic Upper Fifth Avenue (\$2,000 psf/year).

"India's high streets are demonstrating exceptional resilience

and growing global prominence. Premium destinations like Khan Market, Connaught Place, and Galleria Market are attracting international and domestic brands, driven by rising affluence and evolving consumer preferences," said Gautam Saraf, Executive Managing Director, Mumbai and New Business, Cushman & Wakefield.

With limited mall supply, these high streets have become strategic hubs for retailers seeking visibility and engagement.

"Year-to-date, high streets have accounted for over half of retail leasing activity, underscoring their critical role in shaping India's retail evolution. This transformation reflects a broader trend of premium and experiential retail, positioning India as one of Asia Pacific's most dynamic markets," Saraf added.

India's Tier 1 cities led the rental growth in APAC region, with Gurgaon's Galleria Market recording a 25 percent increase, followed by Connaught Place in New Delhi (14 percent) and Kemps Corner in Mumbai (10 percent). IANS

India's growth to be driven by domestic demand as external environment stays uncertain: Morgan Stanley

NEW DELHI: India's economic growth will remain firmly anchored by domestic demand even as external conditions stay uncertain, Morgan Stanley said in its 2026 India Economics Outlook, projecting a "continued Goldilocks environment" for Asia's third-largest economy.

The report forecasts real GDP growth of 6.8 percent in FY26 and 6.5 percent in



FY27-28, driven primarily by an uptrend in household consumption, improving urban sentiment, and a broadening investment cycle.

"The growth trajectory will be supported by a broadening of domestic demand, while external demand remains clouded by uncertainty," the research note states.

Morgan Stanley notes that a pivot in monetary and fiscal policy is helping revive urban consumption, which had softened due to high real interest rates and sluggish hiring trends.

With 100 bps of rate easing in 2025 already transmitted and additional tax reforms, including income tax cuts worth Rs1

trillion and GST rationalization, disposable incomes are rising.

At the same time, rural demand remains buoyant, supported by record agricultural output, favorable rainfall, and rising real wages. The report highlights that real rural wages have grown 3.1 percent in calendar year 2025, till date (CYTD25), compared to 1 percent

in 2024.

Morgan Stanley says India's post-pandemic capex cycle, initially led by public and household investments, is now expanding as private sector spending begins to pick up. Capacity utilization has stayed above the long-term average for the past

year, while new private investments are gaining traction in sectors such as clean energy, data centers, semiconductors, electronics, EVs, industrial real estate and healthcare.

A recent RBI study cited in the report suggests a rise in private project financing to Rs 2.7 trillion in FY26, up from Rs 2.2 trillion a year earlier.

However, services exports remain more resilient, up about 11 percent in CYTD25, but face uncertainties from US immigration policy changes such as the steep hike in H-1B visa fees to USD 100,000 and the proposed HIRE Act, which would impose a 25 percent excise tax on offshore services.

Despite external risks, macro-stability

Goods exports remain fragile, growing only 0.9 percent in CYTD25, with sectors such as textiles, leather, and gems & jewelry seeing pressure, especially after the US imposed 50 percent tariffs on several Indian products from August 27. Exports to the US fell sharply, declining 20 percent month-on-month in September.

indicators remain "in the comfort zone," the report notes. CPI inflation is expected to align with the RBI's 4 percent target by FY27, while the current account deficit should remain at or below 1 percent of GDP. Forex reserves and low external debt are projected at 18.3 percent of GDP in FY27, which provides an additional buffer. ANI

"Progress on the proposed India-Israel Free Trade Agreement (FTA) is also expected to be reviewed," according to the statement.

The minister will participate in the India-Israel Business Forum, involving leading business associations and industry representatives from both sides.

The Forum will include opening and closing plenary sessions, technical discussions, and structured B2B engagements aimed at expanding commercial

partnerships, promoting investments, and identifying avenues for joint ventures in priority sectors.

In addition, the fourth edition of the high-level CEOs Forum would also be held with prominent CEOs from both sides.

Goyal is also slated to meet senior leaders from

major Israeli companies in fields such as agriculture, desalination and waste water treatment, cyber security, smart mobility, infrastructure among others, and interact with prominent Israeli investors.

In addition to official engagements in Tel Aviv, the program includes visits to key institutions and innovation hubs offering insights into Israel's cutting-edge technological ecosystem. *IANS*

Rajasthan: 65,490 animals treated via 'unique' initiative

JAIPUR: The Animal Husbandry Department of Rajasthan has taken a "landmark step" in technological innovation by introducing a chatbot-based system for the treatment of sick animals.

This pioneering initiative enables livestock owners to report illnesses, symptoms, and related issues directly to expert veterinary doctors, ensuring prompt medical guidance.

Over the past six months, 82,713 livestock owners have used the platform, resulting in medical assistance for 65,490 animals.

Union Minister of State, Baghel, lauded the initiative and described it as a model worthy of adoption by other states. He praised Chief Minister Bhajan Lal Sharma and Animal Husbandry Minister Joraram Kumawat for driving this innovation and urged wider implementation of the chatbot system across the country

Indian researchers develop smart portable device to detect toxic pesticides in water, food

NEW DELHI: A team of researchers from the Indian Institute of Technology (IIT) Madras and Panjab University has developed a portable, automated optical device capable of detecting extremely low concentrations of pesticide residues in water, food, and the environment that can pose serious risks to human and environmental health.

Conventional laboratory methods for detecting such residues, particularly the commonly used organophosphate Malathion, are expensive, time-consuming, and require skilled personnel.

The new research, supported by the Department of Science and Technology, under its 'Technology Development and Transfer' Program, addressed the challenge by designing a field-deployable, user-friendly device that offers real-time, ultra-sensitive pesticide detection.

The new 'Smart MDD (Malathion Detection Device)' is a colorimetric detection system that employs gold nanoparticles (AuNPs) and comes with an aptamer molecule engineered to recognize Malathion specifically.

The interaction causes a visible color shift -- from red to blue --indicating the presence of the pesticide, a change that the device's built-in optical system precisely measures. This auto-

lished in the peer-reviewed journal Review of Scientific Instruments.


"This technology can have a significant real-world impact. It can help farmers, food safety duce, or soil -- thereby ensuring compliance with safety standards and reducing public health risks," Prof. Sujatha Narayanan Unni, Department of Applied Mechanics and Biomedical Engineering, IIT Madras, told IANS.

"It can also aid in tracking pesticide runoff in water bodies, a major environmental concern," Unni added.

The team demonstrated a detection limit of about 250 picomolar and correlation with lab spectrophotometer results -- metrics that are rarely seen in portable devices.

Currently tested under laboratory conditions, the device will next undergo validation with realworld samples such as fruits, vegetables, and field water sources.

"We plan to extend the platform to detect a broader range of pesticides, strengthening its role in sustainable agricultural management and environmental monitoring," Dr. Rohit Kumar Sharma, Department of Chemistry and Centre for Advanced Studies in Chemistry, Panjab University, told IANS. IANS

Nurses are backbone of healthcare system: Govt officials

NEW DELHI: Nurses are the backbone of the healthcare system, said officials at the Health Ministry while sharing India's progress in the Nursing Healthcare System.

Speaking at a two-day roundtable on strengthening the nursing workforce in India and Australia, the officials deliberated on best practices.

The event, led by the Union Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, in collaboration with Edith Cowan University (ECU),



Australia, and Jhpiego, aimed at fostering deeper cooperation to join pathways to build a resilient, future-ready nursing workforce aligned with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

"Nurses are the backbone of healthcare," said Akanksha Ranjan, Deputy Secretary (Nursing and Dental), Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, while emphasizing the need to build a more resilient and competency-based nursing workforce.

Ranjan also highlighted the gap

in the global nursing workforce.

"While 2.9 million nurses serve globally, the shortage stands at 4.5 million, creating significant global demand and opening pathways for ethical and well-governed nurse migration," the expert said.

"Nurses remain the heartbeat of the healthcare system globally," added

Researchers use AI to create first 100-billion-star Milky Way simulation

WASHINGTON DC: Researchers combined deep learning with high-resolution physics to create the first Milky Way model that tracks over 100 billion stars individually.

Researchers led by Keiya Hirashima at the RIKEN Centre for Interdisciplinary Theoretical and Mathematical Sciences (iTHEMS) in Japan, working with partners from the University of Tokyo and Universitat de Barcelona in Spain, have created the first Milky Way simulation capable of tracking more than 100 billion individual stars across 10 thousand years of evolution.

Their Al learned how gas behaves after supernovae, removing one of the biggest computational bottlenecks in galactic modeling. The result is a simulation hundreds of times faster than current methods.

The team achieved this milestone by pairing artificial intelligence (AI) with advanced numerical simulation techniques.

Their model includes 100 times more stars than the most sophisticated earlier simulations and was generated more than 100 times faster.

The work, presented at the international supercomputing conference SC '25, marks a major step forward for astrophysics, high-performance computing, and Alassisted modeling.

Current cutting-edge simulations can represent systems with the equivalent mass of about one billion suns, far below the more than 100 billion stars that make The challenge is tied to the interval between computational steps: to capture rapid events such as supernova evolution, the simulation must advance in very small time increments.



The same strategy could also be applied to large-scale Earth system studies, including climate and weather research.

Scientists have not previously been able to model a galaxy as large as the Milky Way while maintaining fine detail at the

As a result, the smallest "particle" in those models usually represents a group of roughly 100 stars, which averages away the behavior of individual stars and limits the accuracy of small-scale processes.

In October, Union Health Secretary Punya Salila Srivastava chaired the annual meeting of the NIPI along with Norway's Ambassador to India, May-Elin Stener.

The meeting aimed to review and approve the NIPI Progress Report 2025 and the budgeted work plans for 2025-26 under Phase IV of the initiative. *IANS*

New genetic tool reveals chromosome changes linked to pregnancy loss: Study

MARYLAND: Pregnancy loss affects up to 25 percent of all pregnancies, with most miscarriages occurring in the first trimester and roughly half caused by genetic or chromosomal abnormalities. But when pregnancy loss occurs three or more times, identifying the underlying cause becomes significantly more challenging, and often remains unknown.

Now, two new studies presented at the Association for Molecular Pathology (AMP) 2025 Annual Meeting & Expo in Boston suggest that a cutting-edge technology known as optical genome mapping (OGM) may uncover genetic factors missed by traditional methods, offering new hope for families seeking answers.

Researchers at Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center investigated whether OGM could detect harmful chromosomal changes in patients with a family history or risk of recurrent pregnancy loss who had previously undergone traditional genetic testing, such as karyotyping or chromosomal microarray analysis, allowing direct comparison between methods. ANI

Over 70 Australian schools closed due to possible asbestos contamination

CANBERRA: More than 70 schools in the Australian capital of Canberra were ordered to close due to growing concerns about possible asbestos contamination from decorative sand products.

The government of the Australian Capital Territory (ACT) said that 71 of 94 public schools in Canberra and surrounding suburbs would be closed after an audit found widespread use of sand products in which asbestos had been detected.

It comes after 24 ACT schools and preschools were fully or partially closed for a couple days, with two reopening shortly.

The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) had issued a recall notice over a type of decorative colorful sand after laboratory testing detected chrysotile asbestos.

The ACCC revealed that asbestos had been detected in four more sand products and said they may cause a risk to public health.

ACT's education minister Yvette Berry told Australian Broadcasting Corporation (ABC) radio that the health risk to students and staff is small but that closures could last several days.

She said that education staff, building service officers and volunteers spent the




weekend identifying and mapping the sand in schools so that assessors can remove it safely.

The ACCC said respiratory asbestos has not been detected in any of the tested

samples and is considered unlikely to be released unless the sand is mechanically crushed or pulverized, Xinhua news agency reported.

According to the World Health Organization, Asbestos is a group of mineral fibers with widespread current and historical commercial uses, but which can cause deaths and serious ill-health in workers and other people who are exposed to these fibers (more than 200 000 deaths globally every year, along with a substantial burden of ill health).

All forms of asbestos have been assessed by WHO as causing several types of cancer, and asbestos also causes chronic respiratory diseases. Because of its use in building materials, anyone engaging in construction, maintenance and demolition of buildings where asbestos has been used is potentially at risk, even many years or decades after the asbestos was put in place. *IANS*

Trump backs H-1B visas again despite Republican calls to end program

WASHINGTON: US President Donald Trump once again defended the H-1B visas, saying overseas workers are needed to train American workers.

"If you are going to be making chips, we don't make chips too much here anymore. We are going to be...in a period of a year, we are going to have a big portion of the chip market. But we have to train our people how to make chips. We used to do it, and foolishly we lost that business to Taiwan," Trump said while addressing reporters at the White House.

Last week, Trump, in an interview with Fox News' Laura Ingraham, supported the H-1B visa program.

When asked if his administration planned to deprioritize H-1B visas. He replied, "You do have to bring in talent."

When Ingraham countered, "We have plenty of talent," Trump responded, "No, you don't."

"You don't have certain talents....And people have to learn, you can't take people off an unemployment line and say, I'm going to put you into a factory. We're going to make missiles," he added.

Trump's comment sparked an intense debate with leading Republican and conservative leaders demanding the scrapping of the visa program. *IANS*

\$100,000 H-1B fee 'significant step to stop abuse': White House

WASHINGTON: The White House defended the Trump administration's H-1B visa policy, telling IANS that the \$100,000 application fee is a "significant first step to stop abuses of the system."

In an exclusive response to IANS, a White House spokesperson said that President Donald Trump has "done more than any president in modern history to tighten our immigration laws and put American workers first."

"The \$100,000 payment required to supplement new H1-B visa applications is a significant first step to stop abuses of the system and ensure American workers are no longer replaced by lower-paid foreign labor," White House Spokeswoman Taylor Rogers told IANS.

She also highlighted the recently launched "Project Firewall" to investigate companies flouting the H-1B visa rules.

"The Department of Labor launched Project Firewall as a new enforcement initiate [initiative] to investigate companies

that have abused the H1-B visa system.

The Trump administration is protecting American workers by restoring accountability in the H1-B process, ensuring that it is used to bring in only the highest-skilled foreign workers in spe-

The White House reaction comes days after US President Donald Trump defended the program, saying it's needed to import talent.

In an interview with Fox News' Laura Ingraham recently, Trump was asked if his administration When Ingraham countered, "We have plenty of talent," Trump responded, "No you don't."

"You don't have certain talents....And people have to learn, you can't take people off an unemployment line and say, I'm going to put you into a factory. We're going to make missiles," he added.

Trump's comment sparked an intense debate with leading Republican and conservative leaders demanding the scrapping of the visa program.

Republican Congresswoman Marjorie Taylor Greene posted on X, reiterating her plans to introduce a bill to "ban H1B visas in all sectors" except the medical profession.

"Ending H1B visas will also help the housing market. Ending H1B visas mean more jobs available for Americans and more homes available for Americans...When Americans have good paying jobs they will be able to buy homes as long as they don't have to compete with legally imported labor on visas and rich powerful asset management companies," she added.

However, a leading immigration expert in Washington told IANS that Greene's bill is "one of the most efficient ways to hurt Americans," and would lead to more "preventable deaths."

In an interview with IANS, Sarah Pierce, the Director of Social Policy at Third Way, a think tank, argued that Greene's attempt to target the visa program would "gut access to care overnight."

"Slashing the flow of foreign workers, including the medical professionals her own communities rely on, would gut access to care overnight," she added. IANS Exclusive

A nikahnama and passport copy has surfaced, claiming she is married and has changed her faith.

The pilgrim has been identified as Sarabjeet Kaur, a resident of Kapurthala district in Punjab.

Sikh groups are demanding a probe into her mysterious disappearance.

As per information, she has taken the name Noor Hussain and

married Nasir Hussain of Nayi Abadi Sheikupura in Pakistan.

As per Indian records, the woman travelled to Pakistan on No-

vember 4 with a group of 1,923 pilgrims via the Attari border in Amritsar under a bilateral agreement facilitating visits to religious shrines.

The 'jatha' was led by Jathedar Giani Kuldeep Singh Gargaj of Akal Takht Sahib. After spending 10 days visiting various gurdwaras in Pakistan, the group of 1,922 returned to India.

According to immigration records, Sarabjeet Kaur had gone missing from the group. Her name was not found in the records of Pakistan's immigration while exiting, nor in India's immigration

records for re-entry. IANS

MEA cautions against job fraud cases as Iran suspends visa-free access for Indians

NEW DELHI: The Ministry of External Affairs issued an advisory for Indian nationals travelling to Iran, cautioning them against fake job scams. This advisory comes after Tehran suspended the visa-free facility due to a surge in trafficking cases.

The suspension takes effect on November 22, 2025, and applies to all Indian citizens holding ordinary passports.

In the advisory, MEA alerted the Indian nationals about the multiple incidents where the Indian were deceived into travelling to Iran with promises of high-paying jobs. The ordinary Indian passport holders visiting Iran with effect from 22 November 2025. This measure is intended to prevent further misuse of the facility by criminal elements. From this date, Indian nationals with ordinary passports would be required to obtain a visa to enter or transit through Iran," MEA stated.

"All Indian nationals intending to visit Iran are strongly advised to remain vigilant and avoid agents offering visa-free travel or onward transit to third countries via Iran," MEA added.

In September, the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) is-

sued a similar warning to Indian citizens about the risks of travelling to Iran for employment purposes.

In a weekly briefing, Randhir Jaiswal, MEA Official Spokesperson, highlighted that several Indian nationals have fallen prey to

criminal gangs, being kidnapped upon arrival in Iran and held for ransom

"There have been a number of recent cases involving Indian citizens who have been lured to travel to Iran on false promises of employment, or with assurances that they would be sent further to third countries for employment. Upon reaching Iran, these Indian nationals have been kidnapped by criminal gangs and ransoms have been demanded from their families for securing their release," said Jaiswal.

The visa-free entry is exclusively for tourism purposes, valid for 15 days once every six months, and doesn't cover employment. Criminals are luring Indians with false promises of jobs, often collaborating with unscrupulous agents. *ANI*

SANTIAGO: Chileans are voting in a presidential election shaped by hardline proposals on crime and immigration, Euro News reported. Four years after electing progressive leader Gabriel Boric, the country is now deeply polarized, with a compulsory voting system adding uncertainty to the outcome.

More than 14 million citizens are eligible to cast ballots to renew the full Chamber of Deputies and nearly half the Senate, a vote seen as pivotal for Chile's political balance, according to Euro News.

Concerns over rising immigration and crime linked to transnational networks have fuelled harsh security rhetoric among candidates. Evelyn Matthei said drug traffickers should be "in jail or in the cemetery," while Franco

Parisi has called for "bullet or jail," describing drug trafficking as "narco-terrorism."

The three leading candidates present sharply contrasting visions for Chile's future. Euro News reported that Jose

Antonio Kast, 59, of the Republican Party, is making his third bid for the presidency, setting aside earlier polarizing positions to focus on fighting crime and illegal immigration.

Jeannette Jara, 51, a former minister in Boric's administration and a member of the Communist Party, is prom-

ising more generous pensions, lower electricity prices, and large-scale housing construction.

Johannes Kaiser, 49, a former YouTube commentator and sitting law-maker, has questioned vaccination programs, opposed abortion and pledged to withdraw Chile from climate agreements and the Inter-American Court of Human Rights.

A new compulsory voting law introduced in 2023 could draw millions to polling stations, adding an unprec-

Mumbai's real estate sees \$1.2 billion YTD institutional inflows

NEW DELHI: Institutional investments in Mumbai's real estate market crossed \$1.2 billion in the first nine months of 2025, making it the fourth consecutive year the city has surpassed the billion?dollar mark, as per recent report.

This performance signals Mumbai's strong recovery and return to pre-pandemic investment levels, the report from real estate services firm Cushman & Wakefield said.

At the national level, institutional investment inflows across private equity and REITs reached \$4.7 billion year?to?date.

Cushman and Wakefield forecasts the total inflows to touch roughly \$6-6.5 billion in 2025, potentially making it the second?best year on record for India's commercial real estate.

Domestic institutions grew in the past few years, now accounting for 48 percent of inflows between January and September, with foreign investors providing the remaining 52 percent.

This structural shift has helped offset volatility in crossborder capital flows and strengthened the market's stability, the firm noted.

Office assets remain the dominant choice for investors, receiving 35 percent of year?to?date inflows, followed by residential at 26 percent, retail at 12 percent and logistics and industrial at 9 percent. *IANS*

Maha Cabinet clears new MHADA policy for major affordable housing projects in Mumbai suburbs

MUMBAI: The Maharashtra Cabinet, chaired by Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis, recently approved a new policy for the redevelopment of Maharashtra Housing and Area Development Authority (MHADA) housing projects covering areas of 20 acres or more in the Mumbai suburbs.

This policy is expected to significantly promote affordable housing in large numbers for the citizens across Mumbai and its suburbs.

The cabinet decision is crucial as MHADA intensifies its focus on generating a substantial number of housing units in the Mumbai suburbs through cluster redevelopment, a joint venture model for private land parcels, and the 20 percent inclusive housing scheme for private developers.

Major works include the 142acre Motilal Nagar project and new proposals in Sion, Andheri and Jogeshwari. The plan aims to blend affordable and inclusive housing with the rehabilitation of existing residents while shaping modern, mixed-use neighborhoods.

The cabinet also cleared a proposal for concept-based iconic city development, meant to guide the proper use of land

The cabinet approved amendments to the Maharashtra Public Trust Act of 1950. It also agreed to remove defamatory terms from the Maharashtra Begging Prohibition Act. Following recommendations from the Law and

rehabilitation and resettlement matters, to speed up the disposal of pending cases under Section 64 of the 2013 Act on fair compensation and transparency. A release from the chief minister's office said this measure is in-



held by various authorities in the state, including CIDCO. Under the plan, CIDCO and other agencies will be empowered to create integrated colonies based on approved concepts, covering residential clusters and international commercial zones.

Justice Department, in line with a Supreme Court order, terms such as leprosy sufferer, leper and leprosy hospital will be removed from Sections 9 and 26 of the 1959 Act.

The cabinet sanctioned new posts to handle land acquisition,

'Finally, my own home': Maharashtra's old woman finds dignity, thanks to PM Modi's housing scheme

NEW DELHI: In the narrow lanes of Dhule city in Maharashtra, an old woman named Santosh Choudhary finally feels free from the constant stress of kaccha house. The reason: she now lives under a secure roof of her own, built with support from the Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana (PMAY).



India-Bhutan relationship offers a constructive model for South Asia and a peaceful Himalayan region

ndian Prime Minister Narendra Modi's visit to Bhutan November 11-12 comes at a delicate moment for South Asia, a region navigating economic pressures, domestic political transitions, and the strategic uncertainty brought by shifting majorpower relations. While India and Bhutan share a long-standing partnership rooted in trust, development cooperation, and geographic proximity, Modi's trip carries broader implications for how New Delhi seeks to engage the region and what kind of stability it hopes to cultivate. In many respects, this visit signals continuity rather than change-it reflects India's long-term priorities in maintaining peaceful frontiers and mutually beneficial relations with its neighbors, while acknowledging that South Asia today is no longer the same as it was a decade ago.

tentious bilateral relationships. The partnership is defined by shared cultural ties, geographic interdependence, and decades of development cooperation. Modi's visit, therefore, is a reaffirmation rather than a recalibration. It signals that India sees Bhutan as a key partner in maintaining a stable Himalayan region.

For Bhutan, the visit underscores continuity in its careful diplomacy-seeking economic advancement and diversified external engagement while preserving strong relations with India. Bhutan's foreign policy is rooted in a pragmatic balance: maintaining deep ties with India while gradually exploring avenues for broader international outreach, including dialogue with China. Modi's visit respects this balanced approach.

A Message Of Stability

South Asia today is more fluid and fragmented than in previous decades. Sri Lanka is recovering from the economic crisis. Nepal experiences frequent political turnover. The Maldives is adjusting to new strategic preferences. Bangladesh faces domestic and external pressures. Pakistan remains economically and politically fragile.

In such a landscape, India's visit to Bhutan sends a message emphasizing stability and predictability. Rather than attempting to expand influence through dramatic initiatives, Modi's approach emphasizes steady engagement-through infrastructure, energy cooperation, connectivity, and people-to-people exchange. South Asian states, large and small, increasingly prefer partnerships that support domestic development and regional peace rather than geopolitical rivalry. India appears to acknowledge this reality by focusing on practical cooperation.

Himalayan Security Without Confrontational Signaling

The Himalayan region remains sensitive for India, Bhutan, and China alike.

Bhutan's ongoing boundary discussions with China have been closely observed across the region, not only for their implications on territorial questions but also for what they signify about evolving

regional diplomacy. Bhutan aims for a peaceful resolution of its boundary issues and seeks to handle both India and China with sensitivity and independence.

Modi's visit, in this sense, does not attempt to counter or overshadow Bhutan's engagement with China. Instead, it affirms India's willingness to maintain open communication and mutual respect regarding Bhutan's sovereign choices. At the same time, the visit quietly reinforces India's interest in preserving stable Himalayan frontiers-a goal broadly shared by all countries in the region.

This balanced approach benefits all sides. It avoids escalatory rhetoric, supports Bhutan's diplomatic autonomy, and aligns with a wider South Asian desire to keep the Himalayan region free from tensions.



When asked about her decision to join "Masti 4," Singh explained that the main reason was the film's stature as a major franchise releasing in theatres. IANS



Red Fort blast: India facing a new form of Jihad?

n 10 November, after nearly a decade, India witnessed its first major terror attack in the heartland, beginning in the national capital, killing 13 people and injuring more than 20. The largest bomb strike since the 2006 Mumbai train bombings has blurred what were once clear red lines on terrorism against India. The Red Fort blast must be viewed as a serious warning-possibly the beginning of a new phase of

lence. No terror outfit has claimed the Red Fort attack. This suggests an evolving form of subversive terrorism-blending direct and indirect methods such as sabotage, institutional infiltration, front groups, kidnappings, and targeted assassinations.

Echoes Of IM-SIMI Era

This shift recalls the pattern seen with the Indian Mujahideen (IM) and the Students Islamic

A New Shift in Terror Strategy

Three key shifts emerge from the horrific attack in Delhi.

First, terror "gloves are off." The audacity to strike India's heartland-a pattern common in the early to mid-2000s-had diminished after 2014 as the focus shifted to Kashmir. Its return is alarming.

Second, the tone and nature of terror modules have changed. Earlier, attacks were directly claimed by outfits or splinter groups that recruited openly and took responsibility.

Third, the present trend reflects greater complexity and siMovement of India (SIMI), where radicalization centered on youth and students, who formed the core of these organizations. Both groups targeted urban centers and executed high-impact serial bombings to create maximum shock.

SIMI-originally set up for religious education and reform-radicalized along communal lines during the 1990s and early 2000s. Inspired partly by the 1979 Iranian Revolution, the organization rejected secularism and democracy. About 90% of its members were university-educated youth and the group supported extremist ideologies through violent "social" activism.

Following the ban on SIMI, it received support from external

groups such as Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT) and the Bangladesh-based Harkat-ul-Jihad-al-Islami. This support facilitated the emergence of the Indian Mujahideen in 2003. It ushered in a new phase of indirect attack methods, where the main outfit enabled bombings without direct involvement.

The ISI's infamous Karachi Project used LeT and other groups to train Indian youth. They were indoctrinated, trained in IED construction using locally available materials, and deployed into Indian cities-with the aim of leaving no visible Pakistani footprint and creating a band of radicalized Indian Muslims. This method fuelled the bombings in Jaipur, Pune, and Ahmedabad (2005-2010).

The cases of Sayed Zabiuddin Ansari (Abu Hamza)-who taught Hindi to the 26/11 attackers and relayed instructions via VoIP-and Yasin Bhatkal, co-founder of IM and perpetrator of multiple blasts, illustrate this pattern.

Spotters played a key role by identifying vulnerable youth-often blue-collar workers-whose grievances could be exploited for radicalization.

Rise Of White-Collar Terror

For perhaps the first time in India's terror landscape, an entire module of white-collar, professionally educated recruits appears to have carried out a major attack. This marks a disturbing evolution in terror strategy.

This new phase involves a hybrid of indirect and inspired terrorism, where online propaganda by groups like Jaish-e-Mohammed and LeT motivates self-radicalized individuals-often lone wolves-to execute attacks.

FUNDING VARSITY CRUCIAL

A major setback to Trump administration came recently with a US District Judge order to stop, freezing or, threatening to withhold federal grant funds; to the University of California; as part of a nationwide pressure campaign to impose a raft of policy changes on elite colleges. The Judge sided with a coalition of faculty groups and employee unions that had accused the administration of trying to silence faculty research and speech.

The judge voided the administration's termination in late July of about \$584 million, in federal grants for research projects at the University of California at Los Angeles, over allegations that campus leaders failed to stop harassment of Jewish and Israeli students.

The Trump administration has targeted dozens of colleges and universities with funding freezes as part of a crackdown on diversity programs and complaints of anti-Semitism during campus protests over Israel's war in Gaza. The Ivy League's Harvard, Brown and Cornell, have been other high-profile targets of the initiative.

The Judge also concluded that the "retaliatory conduct" was unconstitutional. As it is well known that every great university system, both public and private, is built on predictable government support.

In the US, private universities like Stanford, MIT and Caltech each receive hundreds of millions of dollars annually from federal agencies. Every grant carries an overhead, often between 40 and 60%, to support laboratories, staff, maintenance and compliance systems. These overheads sustain the invisible infrastructure that keeps research alive. Without them, even the wealthiest private universities would struggle to survive.

India on the other hand has taken a very different approach. Research grants rarely include realistic overheads, and often none at all. Public institutions may receive less than 10%, while private universities are sometimes required to provide co-funding to qualify for government grants. In effect, the overheads are negative. Instead of being supported for taking up research, universities must spend their own resources to participate. Many private institutions hesitate to take government projects simply because they cannot afford to subsidize them. Without adequate overheads, universities cannot maintain advanced laboratories, retain skilled staff or build compliance systems. This policy flaw has prevented India from building a strong and sustainable research culture across both public and private institutions.

Until the 80s even Japan was far behind in funding research in the universities, they were mostly dependent on America's innovation and partly from Western Europe. They finally realized and started to fund. The same happened with China. China on the other hand got help from Japan and concentrated on increasing its manufacturing base. They had the advantage of cheap and skilled labor, which Japan and US did not. Besides, China also sent Tech Spies to the US and Europe to further enhance their technology without investing much in their own innovation. However, they too have now changed. With the economic prowess they now command, China also started to invest in research and development in their universities and labs.

Trump administration's policy to cut research funding will put America way behind rest of the world. US superiority over rest of the world is only because of its leadership and progress in technology and, freedom to venture the unknown.
